





COMMENT

A few less-interesting skateparks shut up shop and suddenly the newspapers decide it's the end of skateboarding as we know it. Rubbish! . . . the clearing away of dead wood occurs in every walk of life. Now the craze has more or less passed - leaving behind a very popular sport - we're able to wave goodbye to the inadequate triers and the quick buck' merchants. Bitter experience has taught boarders to recognise poor product when they see it ... won't get fooled again!

Major parks must be able to provide more than just basic skateboard facilities. Many will want to practise 3 or 4 hours a day and, if at all possible, just about every day of the week. The cost becomes nightmarish.

And not only that, with many parks sometimes cramming on 100 plus skaters per session, that means endless queues for a turn in the pools and/or bowls. Who needs it? RoSPA has demanded that a great number of free and basic neighbourhood parks be provided NOW by councils — and, for once, I agree with them. Only when these become widespread will the large, prestigeous park complexes come into their own.

And, at the risk of offending, I say that our national Skateboard Association must step back from its endless 'emergency' meetings and searches for 'crock of gold' sponsors and grow some sharp teeth. It's grass roots work that's needed right now. Where is the lead that British skating so badly needs, where are the coaching schemes we were promised?? . . . the answer is no-where. Even the general press media seems to have given up looking for an official Association spokesperson in times of controversy. Perhaps the most damning indictment of all is that, of the 20 or so top flight UK skaters I've asked, none would BY CHOICE become members of the Association The standard reply I heard was, 'what difference does joining make to me? , in the short term it's a good question.

A 'book to take a leaf trom' is the South Coast Skateboard Association who're looking more like a national association every day. They're organised, they get things done, they run regular competitions, give talks on safety, produce a marvellous news sheet, send out a mountain of general information to just about anyone who wants it and more or less act as a fulcrum for most of the country's southern clubs. Increasingly, too, they're been lending a hand to other British associations . . . watch out the National!

And finally, to ease a little further towards the optimistic, welcome aboard to the Scottish Skateboard Association (SSA) who seem, on paper anyway, to be heading off in the right direction. They've got plenty of good, practical advice to dispense, so anyone north of the border who hasn't yet made the connection, the address to write is: SSA, 25 Montpelier Park, EDINBURGH EH10 4LX.

Finally, Eastbourne's Skatecity crew wiped up the freestyle, taking first, second and joint third. Winner was Andy White riding a 27" Santa Cruz with Mid Tracks and 70mm Red Kryps. Second came Kevin Lee and joint third was Mark Perkins (Skatercity) and Stuart Kendall (Bristol). Moral of the day - if you're taking part in contests, read the rules. Skateplaces

GILLINGHAM

The Black Lion Sports Complex in Mill Road is the site for The Black Lion Skatepark, due to open any day now. The five runs include; 7m x 3m pool, 30m snake run a large halfpipe and a slalom run that leads into a 20m x 20m reservoir, (similar in design to the one at Brighton's Barn).

There's a restaurant and first aid facilities on site and all safety equipment is hireable. Test Team report coming soon.

CLACTON-ON-SEA

Skatopia opened at the beginning of June on the old Warwick Castle site in Clacton's town centre. It features a downhill slalom run into a bowl, a performance bowl — 4m deep, and a 40m snake run ending in a large, flat freestyle area. Sessions are 2½ hours long and cost 50p for nonmembers and 30p for members who've paid the £2 annual fee.

TORBAY

This month something of a West Country update. Torbay Park should now be open and though small, it's interesting. There are two linked bowls, one 5m deep and the other measuring in at 3.5m deep. There's also a large freestyle area.

ST. AUSTELL

The town's first skatepark has been built by Bill Cross, the man behind the Exmouth Skatepark (see New Parks & Bowls Pt. 3) and includes such delights as a 4.5m deep bowl and a 20m x 35m freestyle area.

EXMOUTH

The previously reported outdoor extension to the Exmouth Park should now be completed. It features a 45m square area with banks, halfpipes and moguls. Naturally there's also good space for freestyle.

INDE

Melandreth Holiday Camp is the location for Looe's first park which opened in mid-May. The outdoor site has two linked bowls of 2.5m depth, a 35m snake run and a halfpipe run.

HOLYWELL BAY

This small skatepark, featuring a slalom run and a bowl, was opened by Jock Paterson in May. Reports coming through say that the surface is a bit lumpy.

BARNSTAPLE

The Earth and Ocean park next to the Leisure Centre at Severn Brethren Bank should now be open — or at least very close to it. At presstime, plans were afoot for a large, tiled pool with coping and a freestyle area.

PLYMOUTH

Plymouth Skatepark should now be in operation (opening day scheduled for the end of May). So far, the six acre site looks like being one of the most advanced in Europe — certainly one of the better British parks.

Situated on the site of the old Plymouth Zoo in downtown Central Park, there's no less than five runs of varying ability level (all in hand trowelled concrete) and a 7m pipe — the first to be installed in a UK park.

The 'Donut' is a beginner's bowl, shaped like a saucer with a hump in the middle; the 'Mogul Run' is an intermittently flat and bumpy area; the 'Tiger Bowl' is a 13m circular halfpipe affair; the 'DZ' run is 25m long and snakes through a number of heavy switchback turns; the 'Walking Stick' — shaped appropriately like that article of support — is a sloping halfpipe, 25m long, that ends in a bowl.

The last two features are most definately advanced runs. Taking a lesson from the mistakes of other park designers, there is no blurring of ability level between facilities. The beginners have the 'Mogul Run' and 'Donut' while the 'Tiger Bowl' is for intermediates.

Aside from all this, the whole area has been landscaped properly — even lawns have been laid — and twelve benches have been provided for weary parents.

The pro shop and hire shop are well-stocked with all the latest gear; the restaurant/

snack bar seats over 50 people and the clubroom will be used for filmshows. Charges are, per 2 ½ hour session, 60p for non-members (45p if you're in a party of over 20 people), 30p for spectators and 25p for all safety gear.

It probably goes without saying that a full Test Team report will follow next issue.

RHYL

Skateworld, in the rollerskating rink on Rhyl Promenade, should now be open. The £6,000 council venture is outdoors, fabricated in sprayed concrete and the runs include a 'concrete wave' snake run, half and quarter pipes and slalom and freestyle facilities. The site is floodlit and skating continues up to 9.00pm on most nights.

HAILSHAM

More details on the Hailsham Skatepark, reported last issue. Open at the moment are two 5m sections of halfpipe (each 3m in depth), a dualslalom run that's 40m long with ramp start and electronic gates in use all the time, and a banked freestyle area. Opening any day now are three bowls that'll cater for beginner, intermediate and advanced capacities — the heaviest being a snake run into a 4m deep swimming pool.

A 2-hour session will set you back only 35p, all safety gear is essential, but hirable (30p for all) and hot or cold snacks are available on site.

CHESTER

Inner City Truckers Skatepark next to Chester Football Club is open, although its future is apparently in some doubt. At the time of going to press, the park had officially closed — but was still being heavily used by skaters — completely unsupervised. We're told there's been three serious accidents already!

Chester's latest park,
Superskate, is due to open
any day now . . . and maybe
it'll save a few bones. The 2½
acre outdoor site adjacent
to Northgate Arena Leisure
Centre has been very professionally worked. It features
slalom and free skating/
freestyle areas a 120m snake
run, a concrete (6m diameter)
full pipe with a run in and
out, a 'Black Bowl' that's
10m in diameter and 5m
deep — and a mogul area.

Pedestrians are wellcatered for, though completely segregated from the actual skating areas Full Test Team report coming up ASAP.

HARROW

The previously mentioned Solid Surf Skatepark in Harrow (see Skateplaces, issue 9) has been a little delayed, but should now be open.

The design has altered somewhat—the new scheme is a combination of the ideas of Adrian Rolt (of G-Force) and Jim Rennie. The park will now include a 50m slalom run with electronic timing, a freestyle area, a classic pool along the lines of the one at Kidderminster, a rhythm run (70m), two halfpipes, 4m

deep, connected in the middle by the same takeoff point and a half-sphere bowl of depth, 5.5m, with lips varying from rounded to sharp. There's also a 7m fibreglass full pipe and a 17m section of 6m deep halfpipe on a slight gradient . . . it sounds insane.

CHEPSTOW

It seems that the Trinder
Land Scorcher Skatepark
reported in issue 8 has fallen
through. Apologies to all who
wasted time going to the site,
but, try as we might to
verify all reports of parks
before going to press, there're
always some that fall through
when it's too late to change
anything.

WALTON-ON-NAZE

The Martello Skatepark, in Kirkby Road, was opened by the LOGOS Team at the end of last month. At 50p per 4-hour session, the 3m deep performance bowl, slalom and freestyle runs are very good value.

SOUTHPORT

A smallish park recently took its first breath here on the promenade. Solid Surf Skatepark includes a 50m slalom run, a mogul maze, an 80m snake run, two halfpipes, a 7m full pipe and a freestyle area.


GENERAL RUMBLES







LIME GREEN AND BEYOND

Since Skateboard! first hatched a year ago I have had countless requests for reliable test information on the performance of wheels. As skating surfaces improve and skating techniques become more sophisticated, so the need has grown. In response to this, Skateboard! has commissioned an independent test programme, the results of which will appear regularly in Skata Data. The tests take place in Bristol under the direction of Mike Wisternoff (Micky B) and Royce Creasey. Both Micky and Royce have been involved in the research and development of skateboard products for some time and Royce, a contributor to Bike magazine, has done intensive testing of motorcycles and their accessories.

LIME GREEN AND BEYOND

THE SECOND **GENERATION PARK WHEELS** By Mike Wisternoff

and Royce Creasey

Although the Lime Green Kryptonic was not the first high speed park wheel to appear it marked, it could be said, the beginning of an era. The new generation of urethane that has since appeared is better than anything seen before. Fine tuning of traditional hard compounds has improved speed and produced wheels that are so controllable you can pull really heavy drifts at ridiculous speeds without turning into a hamburger.

We have tested a total of fifteen wheels on a variety of test surfaces to cover speed, grip, breakaway, drift, slide and lock-on. The most interesting technical development appears to have been adjustment of bounce (amplitude). 'Fast bounce' wheels are very quick on a good, average park surface; on fine grain rolled asphalt they're unreal. There's a relationship between the frequency of surface

bumps, even tiny ones, and the natural bounce frequency of a wheel. If the latter is correctly tuned the result is a radical speed increase on the right surface. Better still there is enough margin in the relationship to design a wheel that's very fast on any reasonable surface and, at the same time, achieve an improvement in stability. The old problem of snatchy breakaway has disappeared altogether in the better wheels . . . they just go on drifting. High speed stability has also improved and there's

The wide range of performance from similar "fastbounce" wheels indicates that there is still plenty of room for development. Some wheels seem to have the speed/controllability balance about right, others less so. It was noted that the new mixes seem to suit particular sizes of wheels, and it appears the various factors that determine a wheel's performance are becoming increasingly related. Looking to the future it's quite probable that computer modelling will be necessary to predict

a tendency towards centred

(inset) bearings.

the complex and very delicate balance of factors needed for a specific purpose. In addition there may be production problems - several of the wheels showed signs of uneven mix - the Excellerators. Lib Bombs and particularly Wings even showing uneven wear. Probably curing time is a factor in bounce speed adjustments - doubtless these difficulties will be overcome.

The very large number of wheels tested precluded any subjective involvement. However some wheels stood out. The Sims Snake and Excellerators proved the quickest and grippiest wheels on any old surface. On a super surface, where differences tend to disappear, all the wheels seemed very good indeed. The appearance of a competitive English wheel in the Traknology is encouraging and in general we felt that the group of wheels tested could justly be described as the first of a new generation. Before buying, if at all possible, it's a good idea to try out your choice; check your personal preferences in feel and ride. You are very unlikely to be disappointed by

speed or control.

The Tests and Test Surfaces

For speed of work and reliability of results three identical rigs are used in these tests, each being a 28" Bristol Big Foot deck fitted with Trackers. Another essential piece of equipment, proved to be a set of full racing leathers testing wheels to their limits can lead to some technicolour wipe outs!

Grip and breakaway

For these evaluations we use a fine grain asphalt, superfine rolled tarmac or smooth trowelled concrete surface, and, where appropriate, the street. A cone is placed as a fixed reference point at a location where a full turn is possible. The tester sets off from a fixed spot and the cone is moved progressively further down the hill. The test ends when the cone is positioned at the lowest point possible - where breakaway takes place. This allows wheels of similar speed to be checked out against each other. It also allows a direct comparison of breakaway and grip characteristics. As the wheel loses grip the nature of the

breakaway is noted and this is mentioned in the table.

Drift (weighted).

This is checked on a wide slope. High speed sweeping turns are made while downweighting the board on each turn. Although it's difficult to take specific measurements, it soon becomes obvious which wheels are capable of controlled drift.

Slide (unweighted).

Various sliding manoeuvres (e.g. powerslides and Ty slides) are used in this test. Having identical rigs enables us to check wheels through the same maneouvres in quick succession, thus making conclusions possible in a short time.

Lock on.

We have noted in the slide

and drift tests the nature of the resultant lock, (i.e. how the wheel returns to a state of grip). A positive lock is a valuable asset in a wheel. Delayed lock is liable to dump you!

Speed

On the table you'll see that we checked speed on two surfaces. Both are representative of park surfaces, 'A' being an average surface and 'B' being a superfine surface. We've rated the speeds out of 10 points. As you can see, all the wheels lie within a range of 5 to 9 points (we have based the points scale on the speeds of all skateboard wheels — therefore most of these park wheels rate highly). The important thing to note from these ratings is the difference between 'A' and 'B', particularly if you ride on varied surfaces.

EOUIPMENT NEWS

Our test feature on park wheels this month has pointed to one clear fact — the battle for speed and smooth slides is far from over. The appearance of new super-resilient compounds like the Excellerator and Snake is every bit as significant as the appearances of the Red Kryptonic last summer. The mure these 'leapfrog' advancements in technology take place the more that established manufacturers realise the importance of looking one step ahead, and not simply riding on the back of success for a short period.

For this reason we'll see, over the next few months, several "big wheels" in the wheel industry revising their compounds in line with those we've seen just recently. Look out for a radical change in the OJ range - the new models will have the same familiar names (Super Juice, Hot Juice etc.) but they'll all be produced from a new urethane - Thunderline. Another US factory springing into the summer with fresh produce is Park Rider


Their revised wheels are pinkish in colour, and some will also feature radial designs. More news from across the pond .. HPG, makers of the

pond .. HPG, makers of the Gull Wing truck, would appear to be working on a wheel ... ACS have a magnesium 580 model due in August ... and Kryptonics are rumoured to be developing a new non-wheel product (our source is under oath not to reveal what it is) ... Belair have a new deck on the way — the Casper. This 27"/30" stick has been designed by team-member Bobby "Casper" Boyden and features two laminates of poplar with

a mycarta centre (a la Chapstick) . . . the Emotion wheel is being replaced with a new model from the same makers — the Quix. This will also be manufactured with a 50% urethane (inside) 50% rubber (outside) running surface but will feature a twin radius-edge (unlike the Emotion) . . . also, Vans,

the revered skate shoe manufacturers are now making park wheels with the same 'Off the Wall' trade name. These may, or may not, appear in the UK.

One British wheel factory which is currently heavily into research is Arrow/Traknology. Their double-radial parker is proving to be the

hottest British wheel to date and is made in the nowfamiliar pearl white shade (it used to be that skate wheels were nothing but red — now it's white!) Available in 62/ 65/68mm sizes.


Nothing to report from the trucks dept, this month - the "experiments" seem to have dried up for the moment but we await something of earth-shattering importance in the near future. On the subject of Trackers, watch out for counterfeit imitations. One or two very close copies have appeared recently (see our photo for information on how to check for the real thing). Three new British decks to report. Firstly the Ramp Rocker from the 'land of the valleys', Paul Conibear has designed their first deck which is a nine-laminate maple/hardwood ply model. It comes in a choice of 28%" and 30" lengths and is griptaped.


Pacer have also appeared with their long-awaited ply model, the Catalina. It is a maple/ash rocker with kick, length 28", it's predrilled and comes with grip tape.

An accessory we've just received is the Aroflex adjustable flex unit. It's a steel band connecting both trucks which has to be used with an Aroflex deck - since a hole has to be fitted into the platform. At present you can only buy the whole packaged board as shown. Since everyone has moved away from flex decks for bowlriding and freestyle it would seem a rather irrelevant accessory (as has been found in the States where these ideas came and went some time ago).


Finally another word on ripped-off designs. We've been tipped off by Dave Thomas in Newquay to watch out for close Taiwanese copies of the Phoenix and ACS 651. These two are renamed Conquerer No. 2 and Super Conquerer.

Word from Benjyboards that their signature models will be launched soon. These will comprise a John Sablosky 30%", a Jeremy Henderson 27% and 29%". They are also distributing the remarkable handmade, foam-core, Turner Summer ski slalom decks in two degrees of flex: soft and medium stiff. The price — a mind-boggling £75 (grip tape gratis!)



SAILBOARD CONSTRUCTION

Most if not all of the materials should be available at your local hardware store and no special tools are required in the construction. Before giving you the design, we should emphasise that board sailing can be hazardous. Small obstacles can stop the wheels and unexpected changes in wind may pull you off the board. So make sure that you only use the rig within a comfortable wind and speed range. Full safety gear including helmet and pads should always be worn.

Also, a thorough ability at regular skateboarding is essential, since many of the thrills and skills of board sailing require full attention to be paid to the rig - control of the board should be fairly automatic. It is especially useful to be capable of riding the board with either foot forward. This will help in tacking the board to make upwind progress.

Here is a full list of the materials you will need (for this feature, all units will be given in Imperial measure): One piece 8'x4' thick, clear polythene.

Five pieces 4' broomstick. Three pieces 9" aluminium/ steel tube (to make snug fit over the broomstick diameter).

One Piece 10" hosepipe. One piece 2' nylon cord. One plastic end cap to take broomstick diameter. Twelve 1" x No. 10 selftapping screws.

One reel strong terylene thread

Two eyelets (or strong stickytape).

One roll double sided stickytape.

One 2" x 5/16" nut and bolt. One small roll of Sellotape.

CONSTRUCTION DETAILS

The Mast - use three of the 4' lengths of broomstick and two 9" lengths of aluminium/ steel tubing. Locate the metal tubes as jointing pieces between the broomstick lengths. Drill through both metal and wood with a 5/32" or 11/64" drill bit. Screw in self-tapping screws to hold the tubes firmly in place over the two broomstick mast joints. You'll now have made a 12' mast.

The Boom - use the two remaining 4' lengths of

broomstick (Fig. a) and shave the ends so that they can be inserted into the hosepipe. Drill and fit self-tapping screws to hold these in place (5/32" or 11/64" holes). Drill a 5/16" hole across the rear ends of the poles. Drill another 5/16" hole through the midpoint of the hosepipe and a matching hole 4' up the mast (through the mid-point of the first metal mast sleeve).

The Sail - lay out flat the 8' x 4' polythene sheet and cut it thus (Fig. b). Discard the shaded areas. . . sections 'A' and 'B' will form the

Butt together the two sail pieces and cover the join with double-sided tape on the top side. Take polythene sheet 'E' carefully cut 1' from sheet 'D' and sellotape the two together lengthways, making the final sheet, approx 4'x6". Lay a strip of double-sided tape along each edge, one side only. Lay this over the two sections of sail, the patch sticky side down, over the sail join sticky side up and cut to make the same angle shape as the sail at point 'Y'. Carefully seam the 'patch' around its perimeter

with terylene thread, Also stitch along the join between sail sections 'A' and 'B'.

Join together lengthways the two other sheets of polythene ('C' and the remainder of 'D') by sellotaping over the joins (allowing a 14" overlap). Sew along the overlap. Lay a 12" long strip of double-sided tape down one side of this approx 11' x 6" strip and fold lengthways and stick to form a tube. Again, sew along this seam with terylene to strengthen.

Using more double-sided tape, attach this polythene tube to the front side of the 11' tall sail and sew. This tube (the mast pocket) will be fitting over the 12' broomstick mast.


Fix evelets to the top and back of the sail (points 'X' and ('Y'). Alternatively, reinforce these points with several layers of sticky tape, then punch a hole in the back of the sail ('Y') ONLY. The ('X') of the sail will be held to the mast with a self-tapping screw.


Cut a hole 3' up the polythene mast tube to coincide with the hole you've already drilled in the mast. Pass the boom over the sail and slide the mast into its pocket. Use the 2" bolt to locate the boom onto the mast. Using the 2' of nylon cord, tie the rear ends of the two booms together, then pass the rest of the cord several times between the holes and the eyelet in the back of the sail to tension it.

The rig is now complete. Fix the plastic endcup onto your deck, approximately 1" behind the rear bolts of the front truck, by means of a self-tapping screw. You'll find that the pressure of the wind in the sail will provide a down-pressure on the mast that will be sufficient to keep the mast located in the plastic cup. If you should find yourself in a situation you cannot handle, simply lift the entire rig and hold it above your head in the position shown in the sailing diagram for scooting into the wind.

SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

Hold the mast with both hands and allow the sail to blow directly into the wind (Fig 1). Place the mast end in the plastic cup on your board. Hold the mast with





downwind like a flag until you have regained control of the board.

To turn downwind let go of the boom and switch stance so that your other foot is leading (Fig. 6). Gather the boom in again on the other side and find your line across the wind (Fig. 7). Alternatively, having let go of the boom, do not turn round, but gather the boom in on the other tack, behind your back (Fig. 11). You will now be leaning into the wind with your front and holding the mast and boom behind you. Careful at this stage! A sudden lull in the wind will drop you face downwards on the ground.

To bring the board into the wind from your starting position, you should turn the board until the rig is facing directly into the wind so that there is no pressure in the sail. Holding the rig steady in this position, walk around the front of the sail and take up your goofy-foot stance (Fig. 6a).

Continue the turn as the wind fills the sail again, lean out backwards to counterbalance (Fig. 7a). A variation of this manoeuvre is known as the back-tack, where instead of walking round the front of the mast, you retain your original stance, and, as the wind fills the sail on the other side, you lean into the sail - on the wrong side of the sail, as it were. Again, you're asking for it if there should be a lull in the wind. However, you'll find that this is certainly the best position for making upwind progress. If tacking upwind proves difficult, just take the mast out of the plastic cup and hold it above your head while you scoot back upwind (Fig 12).

To stop, simply lift the entire rig out of its locating cup on the deck. Then step off the front of the board holding the rig above your head to avoid tripping over it.

Sailing is mostly done between 15-20mph although more sophisticated sailing boards are capable of twice the wind speed. Forget tricks - remember you are trying to perfect large, flowing turns without scrubbing off any speed. As long as you have a reasonably wide open stretch of tarmac, that isn't surrounded by too many buildings or trees to disturb the airflow, you will find a lot of challenge to push your skills in this exciting variation of the sport.

BE SAFE

Many top pros seem to be suffering from a new and dangerous affliction, the effects of which are possibly worse than the wrist fracture or even the maxiquarter-pounder.

It's main symptom seems to be severe inflamation and swelling about the ego. If this condition becomes widespread it could be seriously damaging to the sport. Bearing this in mind, it would seem appropriate to discuss the safety aspects of going pro.

There are several dangers involved in the radical transition from fun-loving street-jammer to overpaid pro. The dangers come from three directions.

First, Them (the people who are foolish enough to employ you), second, You (the overpaid pro) and third, It (the green stuff they promise to give you every week).

The main danger from

Them is that they will want to buy more of you than you are prepared to sell. When someone decides to pass over a lot of bread the chances are they'll want their pound of flesh in return. A very common demand is that you have to ride their 'Banana Flex' board, 'Biochronic' wheels and 'Saturday Night Close Encounter' trucks. What's more, your shy and sensitive used car salesman from North Watford - now transformed into a leading skateboard entrepreneur will expect you to perform in public, so all the grems can laugh at your 'Bongo' helmet (Mongolian Standards Authority approval pending) and purple, yellow and pink team shirt.

The second danger is from You. A professional skater is expected to be better than all others around. To claim the title 'pro' one has to be slick and stylish. That-can be a real pain if you don't get off on performing.

The last snag is the money, desire for which may well drive you to agree to these ridiculous conditions.


On a more serious note, there are many other problems associated with professional skating, not the least of which is the unequal battle between youthful inexperience and big business. There are many sharks fighting over the rare skills of a few young skaters.

Perhaps the more together pros should combine into a form of union — rather like racing drivers. They could insist on minimum safety levels, arrange insurance, check contracts and generally represent the skater's side of


the arrangements. After all, apart from the grems who finance the whole thing with their pocket money, they are the most important ingredient in the cake.

The final and possibly most serious dangers affecting pros are delusions. The first, and most common, delusion is that you are no longer an ordinary mortal who has to behave like everyone else and queue for runs (and actually tolerate the presence of others). The second is that your every movement is under the close scrutiny of the vast, all-watching public.

The paranoia strikes that if you fail to make a 180, treble kickflip on the coping the entire skateboarding press will hold the front page and questions will be asked in the House. It just ain't true. . . after all, you're just a bloke who gets paid to play with one of those silly toys with wheels on.



















PAUL ROBERTS

INTERVIEW



Talking to Paul Roberts, you don't quite know whether to believe him or not.

Undoubtedly one of Wales' hottest skate properties, one minute he'd have you believe he'd give it all up for surfing — but for the money — the next, you're detecting just the merest glimmer of enthusiasm!

Paul, you're getting better at skateboarding all the time. Are you into it for the fun, or for the money, or what? I'm purely in it for the money! I'm riding for the Welsh Skateboard Centre and also for a firm that's building modular skateparks — called the Mistral Park. I had something to do with the design. It's fine for small kids, but not much good for progressive skateboarders.

So how do you relate to skateboarding as a sport? I don't really think of it as a sport at all. I just do it. I suppose it's more of a pastime.

But surely competitions emphasise the sporting side of it?

All the competitions I've been in have been so badly organised they just didn't make any sense.

If there was to be one, big, really well run competition with good prize money, would you enter it?

Doubtful... you see I'm not against the competition scene at all; it's just that I personally don't like competitions. It's good for some, but I think people start to take things too seriously. Then all the fun goes out of it — as soon as people start getting heavy.

You mean all these manufacturers getting into it and kids wanting to turn pro. Yeah, it takes everything out of it.

Let's talk about South Wales. Is it like in London where every kid on every street corner has got a skateboard? You know, riders want to turn pro as soon as they think they're the slightest bit good.

Oh, it's all like that. . . all round the Swansea, Cardiff area. Except they've got nowhere to skate. That's why you don't hear anything about them. There's one park in the whole of Wales and it's nearly a quid to get in. So half the kids don't bother anyway.

Presumably you're referring to the Hollywood Bowl? Yes, it's good as a first try, but they could have put a lot more thought into it. Seeing as the guy went to the States, he didn't do a very good job; he used the wrong surfaces.

He's been skating 3½ years now, not bad for someone who: "... hated it first of all — it was just something to do when the surf was flat".

Paul claims in an almost embarrassed sort of way that he bought his first equipment — Hammaco Whites and Hammaco Trucks — because he couldn't afford to buy a surf-

"I don't like any flex in a deck at all, so fibreglass is out. And I reckon aluminium is dangerous as well as impractical".

For a rider who's basically surf-stoked, Paul Roberts shows remarkable skating determination. His pure, go-for-it style translates with tremendous visual impact — few look so exciting, yet confess to being so bored. Skateboard!'s Adam Peacock wrestles with this apparent contradiction.

board. The decks he made himself. . . always out of wood.

What's the talent situation in Wales. . . are there many up-and-coming riders? Swansea's got a lot, but I don't see much in the Cardiff area. Swansea's been skating longer than Cardiff and they've got a more go-for-it attitude. Everything's so slow moving in Cardiff, When the Welsh Skateboard Centre first opened there, the sales went wild. But the kids just don't seem to progress. they're still skating on the roads - like I was nearly four years ago.

So the only thing that's changed is their equipment. Yes, most of them have good gear to ride on, although there's still a lot of crap around. There's a few outlets in town who're still dishing out rubbish — Taiwan stuff — and there's a lot of kids falling for it. It's upsetting. . . I like to see kids skating on good equipment.

What about North Wales? That's part of the country we hardly hear anything about,

That's because there're hardly any skaters there — or if

there are, they're not into anything.

Is it more just surfing communities up there? No, no, because the surf is mainly Winter there anyway. To be honest, I don't really know what those kids are into — south is definitely the main surf area for Wales.

Down in Britain's South West, the age range of skaters is much wider than, say, London, because the surfers have long used skating as a second string pursuit. Does that go for South Wales too? Oh yes, you get that all around the coast. When the surf's flat they just drag out a skateboard. They don't really want to progress. . . they just want to occupy their time.

Do you consciously try to progress your skating at all? Obviously you're into it to have fun, but are you interested in getting to better places to face new challenges? I just do it. . . as simple as that. I wouldn't mind progressing, but I don't think there's anything there to progress with. I'm getting

better slowly I suppose. I used to be deeply into freestyle — that was all I'd do. I've rode Skatecity a few times, and also the Watergate bowl — pretty bad parks — in fact the one in Gorseinon was the best I've ridden. It's the first real taste of a park I've had. I think the few times I've been there I've done okay.

What sort of facilities do you prefer — what do you look for when you hit a new park? I particularly go for keyhole pools — something you can keep going on and where you don't go all the way down you then have to walk back up again.

What manoeuvres give you the greatest rush? If you mean what do I like doing. . . I like slides, hitting the coping and tiles — if I can get 'em and also trying to scrape axles.

Now at last people seem to be trying to pump money into building parks. Do you think that's where the future for the sport lies?

It's fine to see someone trying to do something properly
— not just slap a piece of
concrete down with some
ramps. Some guys just buy
a cinema up and think they
can make a bit of money by
building a skatepark. Now it
looks like it could get really
good. They're starting to use
proper surfaces and they're
producing shapes that really
work. It's exactly like the
States.

What's your equipment collection at the moment? Well, I'll soon be marketing my own deck, with a bit of luck. It's made up out of South African hardwoods and the one I'm riding at the moment is a slightly wider template than the Hobie Park Rider. The new one I've designed will be a flatkick and a rocker kick and about 7 to 71/2 inches wide, full nose, full tail. . . a really nice looking board. They'll be better than anything that's on the market at the moment! With all these different woods in the laminate, where the wheel wells are cut out you get all these different dark and light woods - it looks nice. They'll be available in 29 and 30 inch.

Who's making them? They're being made for me in South Africa. And what name are they being sold under?
I don't know yet. They won't be available for around 2 months — maybe a bit more. I've got to finally sort out the design.

Are other skaters in Wales getting into the manufacturing side of things?
Well, Con (Paul Conibear) has got his own boards going for him as well — ramp rockers — but from what I've heard he's snapped one or two of them after just a couple of days.

Back to the question of your equipment... what else do you use, when and where? I've only got the one board at the moment and I use either Midtracks or Haftracks and white Yoyo's or Lipbombs. I like the Belair stuff, it's good. I was riding Chapsticks but they kept on breaking. Riding the board I've got at the moment has messed me up a bit. I don't like rockers at all.

What about other wheels...
do you do slalom at all?
No. I don't do slalom or
downhill. I get into high
jump now and again, but
the only things I really like
are parks and freestyle.

What would you do, financially, if you had to leave skating. . . maybe through a bad injury?

I've been sort of involved with Skatesafe safety equipment — the elbow pads and knee pads are partly my design and being co-designer of this modular park I suppose I could get a bit out of that.

Would you like to be more involved with park design to try and ensure some good parks are being put up? I would, but without going to the States I can't really get a proper idea of what park designs should be like. I say that because, with so many good parks over there, you'd get plenty of ideas. Trying to get it together off the top of your own head is a bit difficult.

Have you thought about going to see all the bad parks over here and checking out where they've gone wrong?

Yes, there's a lot in that. In Gorseinon there's the halfpipe and the snake run which could have been done

a lot better. I hear they're thinking of resurfacing the bowl but by doing that they're going to make it smaller. It's only about ten foot deep now so that could sort of mess it up.

What's it like being on the fringe of what's happening? What do the Welsh kids think about being out of the centre of things. . . not many facilities and so on? I think a few of them are upset because everyone seems to relate to London as the energy spot and there are good skaters in South Wales. So I think there's some bitter feelings.

Do you have any close friends here that you always skate with? No, not really. Most of my friends are into surfing and they think I prefer skating to surfing simply to make a living out of it. At the moment there's no professional surfing around the Welsh coast. . . no one makes a living out of it. Most of my friends work in factories and so on. They just work to get money to surf. That's what I'm into really.

Have you made much out of skateboarding as yet? Yes, a reasonable amount. I

Yes, a reasonable amount. I did a bit of TV for some Welsh stations and for BBC area news — and some kids programmes as well. I got a bit out of that and of course some publicity as well through local papers.

What do you see as the best way of making a living out of skateboarding?

Well, it's got to be advertising. You've got to get hooked up with a good team who're prepared to back you all the way. I haven't got that at the moment although I hear somebody's thinking of setting up a Welsh National team.

If you were offered the chance of being on a good team, would you consider moving somewhere else... to, say, Bristol or London? No, I couldn't move away from the coast — even if it was to work in the week. I don't think I could cope with it. As it is at the moment I've got a really easy number... but I've gotta

skate now and again for the money.

So what do you do to survive when you're not skating? Well, I live with my parents, but I don't feed off them at all. If I'm not skating and earning a bit of money, the Welsh Skateboard Centre give me a small retainer - instead of a proper wage. I think though, with more parks springing up all over the place there'll be other jobs. I had the chance of being Assistant Park Manager at Gorseinon and Shop Manager. The trouble is I live nearly 40 miles away from the place and it would cost too much to get up and down there. It wouldn't really be worth my while

Have you ever skated elsewhere in Britain?

Well, I spent 2 months last year in Cornwall, surfing and doing a bit of skating. That's when I really got involved with the team aspect. I was just bumming round and Skewjack Holiday Village asked me to skate for them. So I went up to the Watergate International and I did quite well considering I really only messed about on the board. I came 5th in the freestyle and 6th in the bowl. I was quite pleased, cos it gave me a rating up against the London skaters.

What would your ideal compromise be between skating, surfing and earning money? I'd like to get involved with a firm that manufactures surf-boards and who paid good money to skaters. If there is a pro surf circuit I could make a bit out of both, maybe. I don't say I'm that good at surfing. . . it just holds more for me than skating.

Back on teams again, do you expect to see the Welsh as a whole, rather than just South Wales, starting to compete against England? They really think they can, so I see no reason why not. I've

seen quite a few London

skaters — I was at the Horticultural show — and I'm impressed by them. I'll say that much. They're progressing all the time and I think it'll take the Welsh some time to catch up. They will eventually. . . though maybe not totally.

How would you compare the attitudes?

Well, there's some who'll really go-for-it in London and there's the other type around here who just do it for the sake of doing it. They aren't go-for-it at all. We get a hell of a lot of grems. . . there's only maybe a dozen rateable skaters in Wales at the moment.

When Chaput and Gambino came over for the opening of Gorseinon, did skating with them help the locals at all?

Yes and no... I wasn't totally impressed by their performance there because it was sort of restricting for them — being such a small

place. In fact I was supposed to be going to stay with Chris Chaput but I've had hassles getting a visa so I'll have to re-apply. I don't know when I'll get out there

What did the two of them think of Wales?

Oh, they really liked most of the people. But half the guys here didn't really bother with them - except to get all they could for nothing stickers, wheels and so on. They scrounged off them and then disappeared. We took the guys out a few times for a couple of beers but I think they were a bit upset that more people didn't want to know them socially. All they got all the time was kids wanting things for nothing. They said they were having a good time but to be honest I think they were a bit pissed off.

How long did the two of them stay?

Chaput was over for two weeks and Gambino was over for nearly a month. Chris is a really great guy. . . but I thought Gambino was a bit conceited.


Why do you think they didn't come down to London at all? I think simply because they were tied to the bowl. Belair are heavily involved. . . in fact I think the Welsh team may be called Belair — that's the rumour I've heard. I don't know if I'd be on that or not — I might have other work commitments.


Would you like to be on it because I guess they'd be paying competition money, basic money, expenses and so on?

If there was a good basic wage, then maybe. But apart from that, I don't think so. I don't want to get tied up too seriously with skateboarding. One day I'm just going to say I've had enough and I'll go. I don't want to hurt people in the process.


So, if that's the case, what do you see yourself doing in a couple of years?


Oh, I'll probably get right out of skating altogether... maybe emigrate to Australia. I'd like to live by the Indian Ocean. Wales is really crowded these days and it doesn't hold anything for me. The surf's inconsistent.

ularities' and increasing the width, perfect hills can be created for just doodling around (or hill-jamming, as it was originally known). And add the kind of banks that were present at the birth place of such skating talents as Tony Alva and Stacy Peralta (the famous Junior High School in Santa Monica) and maybe we'll foster the kind of skating that it produced

For slalom you need a specialised run with facilities such as timing and starting or grems doing coffins on polyprops. Such runs would become meccas for serious professional and amateur racers to come and polish up their style and work off those hundredths of seconds.

The mogul maze seeks to provide the most number of route choices of any facility created. From the simple run down the mellow snake to the radical assault on the moguls (armed with suspenders to get maximum air) the rider can trace the route that suits his ability or whim. The

radicalness so as to be challenging, but not dangerously unmanageable.


The final run is a novelty inspired by freestyle skiing; in fact all the runs this month owe a lot to that sport. The idea is to provide a safe way of performing and perfecting aerial stunts. GOING-FOR-IT

Mark Baker talks us through the elevator drop he performed recently at the Barn Skatepark, Brighton. He was on a Power-

flex deck with Trackers and Powerflex 5's. "The thing to remember when doing a trick as dangerous as an elevator



drop is not to hesitate when it comes to the actual fall. Bearing that in mind, place the kicktail flat on top of the coping, making sure the board is set straight ahead towards the way you're going, and that the wheels are hard against the coping. Holding the board steady with your forward hand, place your back foot comfortably on the kicktail and, without hesitation, step straight onto the front of the board. Your front wheels must hit the wall on the way down — or you'll end up doing a wheelie. The best way of practising for them is by starting in small bowls or by trying sit drops. There you sit on the board, flat on top of the wall, and literally drop in, sitting down".

Mark Sinclair demonstrates the 'Cess Slide' in the pool of Kidderminster Safari Skatepark. He's riding a Benjy 'Sinclair' deck with Fultracks and Lime Greens. The essence of the manoeuvre is to consider it as one continuous movement. 'Put your front foot slightly behind the front truck and the back one on the kicktail. The line you take up the wall is important in that, if too straight, you'll only end up doing a 180 slide. The best line is similar to that taken for a frontside carve. . . roughly 45 degrees to the wall. The first slide is the critical one, as you'll be travelling at what seems an impossible angle to the wall. Your first reaction will be to kickturn out of it, but instead, don't put any pressure on the board, rather, consiously slide the tail up to the lip. Gravity will now start to topple you. Using this, redirect your weight down the wall, as in doing a simple rock walk, by sliding the nose of the board, downwards".



TECHNO TALK

CONCRETE VS. FIBREGLASS MODULES

WHY MODULES?

The first obvious question is, why choose modules at all ...why not just stick with concrete and wood? A module designer will point out that when you order a permanent, concrete park you cannot be exactly sure of what may be the end result; there are many factors which could influence the quality and performance of the final product.

To begin with, the design itself may be ill-founded . . . perhaps the transitions and shapes are wrong. Laying good shotcrete depends on having available, skilled labour. Once the bad job has been completed, corrections are hard to make.

With a modular system, however, certain aspects of the product can be guaranteed — surface, basic transitions and radii. A good company will be able to describe a number of ways of putting together their modules, but the end result will be predictable. With luck, you'll be able to see the park in action before you buy it! The risk factor is considerably reduced.

Another powerful selling point for the module is having the option to dismantle, rearrange or remove should the prophets of doom prove right and the sport dies on us.


WHICH MATERIAL?


The next factor to decide on is what material should be used, Right now, modules are on offer in glass reinforced plastic or cement, fibreglass, wood and plain ordinary reinforced concrete forms. Certain materials are more suitable for different requirements. The prospective owner must discover what his actual needs are.


Both the glass reinforced systems are light and strong . . . both also have problems with surface and expense. They involve fairly fancy technology. Those, however, who resort instead to conventional concrete must expect to suffer the consequences of the increased weight and subsequent difficulties in

The whole subject of modules has, of late, received a great deal of attention from park-builders, designers and prospective clients alike. In this article we investigate the many factors that influence choice of module — in particular, the available range of construction materials.

handling. On the other hand, cement surfaces are familiar to the majority of skaters . . . they offer no bizarre traction properties.

Surface wear is another factor to take into consideration. There's little problem with straightforward concrete, but use of wood or plastic may increase maintenance costs. Resulting surface inconsistancies can even, at

times, prove dangerous.

Given the choice, and provided the standard of construction used is satisfactory, I'd personally favour glass reinforced cement. It provides the familiar cement surface (with good durability and traction) in a much lighter weight than ordinary reinforced concrete. On a cost comparison between the two there seems to be conflicting evidence. Check several different manufacturer's prices before deciding.

Fibreglass (glass reinforced plastic) seems a little extravagant and it also offers a rather difficult skating surface because, in the main, of its lack of porosity. The standard gel-coat surface becomes hellishly slippery even if only slightly damp (a sweaty rider falling on it can be enough). Applied high-grip surfaces to overcome this problem tend to offer painfully abrasive wipe-outs.

WHICH SHAPE?

A module designer is confronted with several choices of design when outlining his basic module. He has to decide radii of curvatures, degree of radicalness, ease of installation and variety of adaptations. It can be a big mistake to stick to a system that offers only an 'easy' ride. When the park owner wishes to upgrade his facility, he has then to replace and start all over again.

Systems that rely on only cylindrical sections, with no spherical curves should also be avoided . . . they limit the choice of design drastically.

WHICH SYSTEM?

The question to ask when making a choice is, how well conceived is the system as a whole? Ones like those offered by Architrac and Radical Banking have been developed by competent pro engineers and skaters. They're also made by a reputable company who're unlikely to go bust and leave you with a system you can't extend. A good deal is one that offers healthy guarantees and a 'no strings' maintenance service.

Summing up, the basic rule is, buy from a pro company — perferably one with track record, so you can go see the results. As with all skateboarding purchases, consult experts, consider safety and bear in mind that you may want to upgrade in the future. Above all, when entering the market place, caveat emptor!



only in the last four months
been transferring much of
her affection for contemporary dancing to the theatre
of the park. Shane too has
only been feeling the rush for

Seth, who took the lead
originally, has but a year and
a half's skating to his credit.

Seth, now 12 years old, first caught the skate bug through borrowing a friend's board. The result was highly infectious and before long 'mum' was cajoled into footing the bill for her son's equipment.

Months of perseverance followed 'till finally Seth made the graduation from 'just another grem' to young hottie, the magic transformation taking place in the old Skatecity (or Skateways, as it's now called) Black Bowl.

Suddenly he was being compared with skaters three or four years his senior. Since then he's taken a 1st for junior pipe riding at the Horticultural Show and a 3rd in open pipe and tied 3rd in junior rampage at the Sobell competition. He was also well placed at the Skatepark '78 contest.





Cheap wheels can't perform well. They wear
out quickly. And they can throw you.

So maybe they don't work out so cheap. In fact, there's nothing good that can be said

about them.

But we'd better tell you the bad things. Otherwise your Dad could be throwing good money away.

Words of warning.

Don't be fooled by looks. It takes more than pretty colours to make a good wheel.

So watch it. Cheap soft wheels

are liable to crack and split.

Cheap hard wheels are no better, because they are brittle and liable to craze and break up.

They are also dangerous.





Hitting the precise balance between the need for high speed and good grip is a fine art.

For, in order to be fast, a wheel must remain round at speed. If it flexes out of shape, it wastes energy, which slows it down.



The obvious answer might seem to be wheels which are simply very hard.

NEW PARKS & BOWLS

PART 5

WANDSWORTH

Of all the parks that have opened in London recently, Skatecircus, in Wandsworth, South London has caused the most ripples. Originally a bingo hall, it opened at Easter — and promptly closed again; then it re-opened at the beginning of April, but was partially re-closed once more. Finally it opened properly . . . and trouble hit.

The area it serves is tough and, slowly, rumours came trickling in of fights and other physical-type 'happenings'. Lately, however, the dust seems to have settled a little — certainly all seemed quiet when the Test Team pulled in for a session.

Designed by Skateopia Ltd, and built as a joint venture between themselves and Granada, emphasis seems to have been placed rather too much on high capacity. Where the stalls once were, there's now a wide open space — 30m x 25m — completely covered in Ultro-Vinyl, a fast and very grippy surface.

It slopes down to a stage that's banked along its entire length. On the left-hand-side the banking rises to 1m, by the centre it reaches 4m high rampage proportions and on the right the elevation is 4m, but non-vertical. Finally, on either side of the stage there's 2m high vertical banks.

This may all sound like great fun, and so it is when the place is not too crowded. However, when there's 250 skaters milling around at one time (if their maximum capacity claim is true) and half of these are on this area, it must become a real-life struggle for survival.

Suddenly there emerge no less than five traffic flows, three coming down the slope at top speed to use the stage front banking and two at right angles, using the side elevations. The Test Team's advice is to keep those eyes open . . . yes, it really does seem like a major crossroads without traffic lights.

It's the same story with the top area where you walk in. It's flat, measures 20m x 7m and has lino tiles on the floor. There's mellow banks rising to 1m, constructed of timber and Ultro-Vinyl and our feeling was that, with just one small catalyst, we could easily be witnessing a multiperson wipe-out.

But then, when deserted (or nearly so), the area becomes just as much fun as others twice its size. You can forever the banks, shave the wooden mini-coping and lip glide in the bowled-out corners.

The showpiece of the park and the feature which many people come exclusively to ride, is situated on the stage. It's a 13m section of 5m deep halfpipe, built of timber and surfaced with the same Ultro-Vinyl covering. It seemed just about faultless. Tim Levis, John Bull, Paul Sully and Shane Cutts were busy getting vert when we arrived — an instant testimonial.

Skatecircus is sited in the old Granada, Wandsworth Road, London and is open on weekends and holidays from 10am to 8pm and weekdays from 12 noon to 8pm. Sessions last two hours, membership at £2.50 a year is preferred (with sessions then costing 50p). Otherwise, non-members can grudgingly get a visitors admission for 65p.

All pads and helmets are 10p per item and Morris-Vulcan hire boards are 30p. The snack bar in the foyer sells hot and cold drinks and food and upstairs there's an amusement arcade. For minor injuries there are first-aiders on hand at all times.

SOUTHWARK

The Maddog Bowl in London has to be the most exciting indoor park the Test Team has yet visited. There seems little doubt that it'll be setting standards that others will have to try to improve upon. Congratulations, yet

again, to the designers and constructors, G-Force and Skatepark Construction.

Maddog's home is the ex-Astoria Cinema in the Old Kent Road, in London. Just about all of the inner area has been utilised in creating 2,000 square metres of pure skating fun. The intention has very obviously been to build a facility that'll stand the test of time — and not become outdated so quickly that early expansion will be needed.

Dave Parker, the manager, wasn't too sure he'd got it right. "We were thinking, when it opened, that maybe we'd done the wrong thing. Maybe we should give the pool another metre of vertical? But after talking to skaters who know their stuff, the general consensus of opinion is that it's advanced enough now. I think everyone will be happy with it for a long time to come".

Designer, Adrian Rolt, is also the man behind such notables as the Brighton Barn and the West Midlands Park. Using the well-tried, reinforced shotcrete method, there's an average concrete thickness of around 100mms.

The stage was originally over a metre up from the floor, this has been levelled off from the back of the stalls, leaving a slight gradient overall. The building turned out to be a freestanding shell — with no real foundations as such. That stroke of fortune greatly simplified the problem of having to dig down 3m in places, to accomodate the runs.

On the old stage area itself is a nicely smooth freestyle patch measuring 33m x 10m; banked on three sides, this doubles well for a short run flatland slalom.

Running down the entire length of one side wall is the 26m long halfpipe, 7m wide and on average, 3.5m deep. Though the transitions are a bit kinked out in places, it's still very vertical and tough to get wired. Dave Parker relates:

"We had someone up here who was offering a couple of quid to whoever could get two wheels out of the end wall. All the name skaters were here and it was Alex Turnbull who won it in the end . . . but he nearly killed himself doing it!"

A most unique addition is the series of five interlocking mogul bowls, placed in an irregular triangle shape — pointing down towards the stage. They vary in depth from 1.5m to 2m and they're so well worked out, it's possible to work all five in one run. The lips are perfectly rounded for lip slides and wood slides.

The snake run is almost perfection. With an elevation drop of 2m, five bends and a vertical wall of 4m, it's perfect for either working slowly downwards or for taking in a high speed carving run.


The 8m diameter 'classic' pool is where most of the heavy skating goes on. While we were there Mark Baker was blowing minds with his two foot above coping aerials not bad for his first visit – and little Seth Cutts was hanging like a marionnette on the coping. But for most people, the day's high point had to be Mad Mark dropping in to the 4.5m deep pool on an original 15" Surf Flier!

In summary, the marshalls do a good job, and there are enough of them. Spectators have two main areas down each side from which to watch—and they're also free to wander onto the skating areas if they wish.

Accessability, which can easily make or break a park, could prove to be a problem . . . there's no underground or British Rail stations nearby and buses have a habit of being late or not showing up at all.

On site facilities include a snack bar serving both hot and cold, food and drinks. Upstairs on the balcony there's a lounge for resting, plus, if things go as planned, a soda fountain and pool tables.

Dave Parker seems to have realised that spectators are a big part of his business, especially when they're paying for their offspring to skate. He says: "I first got the idea for a skatepark, so then I went along to another to

check it out. There were all these parents literally standing about in the mud with long faces — they couldn't get a drink or anything. So from that I realised that the most important thing, aside from them being able to watch their little Johnny, would be for them to be comfortable — and in pleasant surroundings".


The Maddog Bowl is situated at 601 Old Kent Road, London SE.15. It's reachable by underground to Elephant & Castle, then a 53 bus up the Old Kent Road. Cost of entry is 65p per 2-hour session, but members (£3 a year) pay 40p. All safety gear is hireable at 20p and the snack bar and proshop look very reasonably priced.

WOLVERHAMTON

The Arrow Skatepark was, and still is, Wolverhampton's first and only facility. And, that said, competitors will have a job rivalling it in its scope and thoroughness. The Test Team blew in for a session just about a week and a half after opening day, March 1st 1978.

The ceremonies had been conducted by Bobby Piercy and Jerry Valdez and when the Team got there they were still on hand, along with Jay Adams, Paul Constantineau, Kent Senatore, Bobby Boyden and an unfortunately injured Dave Hackett. Britain replied with Jingles, Si Napper and Cas Peacock and they served notice on the Americans that when it comes to park riding, we're snapping at their heels.

Built by Howard Clayton-Wright Ltd, the park so far covers 2,000 square metres and covers two storeys of a five storey building Hambleden House in Broad Street. Down stairs on the ground floor are two large halfpipes. The smaller is a 5m section by Blue Tile, approximately 3m deep. This provided the scene for some insane halfpipe antics: Jay Adams was consistently pulling off backside breakaway aerials, front and backside rock-slides and generally grinding down the edges. Jingles amazed onlookers with his roll outs - bringing cries of "Marty Grimes!"

from Adams and Constantineau.

Right beside is an even bigger halfpipe, another Blue Tile product, but this time with extension. It's a 14m section, around 6m in depth with 2m of flat wall reaching up to the beams. The traction provided by the factory finish is only moderate, as is the speed. Maybe a coat of something more exciting would help. The rest of the downstairs space has been devoted to freestyle - and the surface is perfectly flat and smooth.

Upstairs is where most of the action is (and was!). It's been very well graded, abilitywise; for beginners, there's a flat area with moderate speed banks around the outside and a double sided bank down the centre of the floor. This middle bank rises to vertical within a metre a rather quick, though rideable transition - definitely a challenge for the more advanced beginner! Interestingly, these banks have been treated with fine silicone particles and fibre coated . . . it's a surface that provides excellent traction.

Side by side, in the middle of this floor, are two identical and mellow bowls, made by Fibretrak. These are fibre molded and concrete sprayed which makes for a slick, fast surface with adequate grip. Measuring only between 1 and 1.5m deep, with diameter of 3m, these bowls are so mellow they make for incredible fun. The lips are square and perfect for lip slide reentries and axle grinds. At one point Adams, Constantineau and Piercy all squeezed in and played 'three-in-a-bowl' to the amusement and confusion of all watching.

The next transition is to a much bigger timber framework bowl finished in plywood decking — though now completely covered in graffiti. This measures up to all of 12m across and 3m deep. The transitions are very gentle and the ride's easy to negotiate. Topping off there's a half metre of vertical, nailed up for those who can reach it.

There's yet another halfpipe, 4m in depth, that's bowled out at the end. This also has a timber frame and a natural plywood finish. The hairiest run, as such starts 5m up. You abruptly drop down to ground level Continued on Page 90

CONE SUBSTITUTE

My tip for slalom cones is to use 'Five Pints' milk bottles. To prevent blowing over, I put about an inch of water in the bottom. However, they should be washed out before use because the water tends to go stagnant, and when the milk which inevitably remains also goes bad, a rather unpleasant smell may evolve should a split occur (when kicked, perhaps, by an irritated skater). The trade name on the bottles can be removed with sand-paper.







PUTTING THE STYLE INTO FREESTYLE

The strange thing about style is that it's hard to actually put a finger on what it is. How can a skater go about improving his skating style?

Let's start from the very beginnings. A glance at the Pocket Oxford Dictionary reveals that a 'style' was the original pointed rod with which ancients wrote on wax-coated tablets. Each scribe presumably developed a unique way of writing or etching. . . in other words, their own particular 'style'. It seems, therefore, that this vital ingredient has, almost by definition, to be personal; it cannot truly be copied.

Style is perhaps more an attitude than a technique. It's to do with co-ordinating various movements and transforms a routine from being a skilled chore into something

Anyone watching Stacy Peralta's fluid footwork while he was over here, or Ellen Berryman's graceful manoeuvres, will have been made aware that they possessed something that pros in the UK are only beginning to understand and get together. On a sunny day in May, Steve Kane set out for the South Bank with Ian Dobey a different kind of skateboard photographer — and a group of South Bank regulars. The mission. . . to uncover a different kind of skateboard photograph and also to search out the ingredients of that rare and elusive commodity, style.

more akin to a dance.

In the early days when boards didn't handle as they do now freestyle was the core of the sport. However, to a lot of people, freestyle was just 'fiddling around' possibly with an additional display of muscle-man gymnastics.

Fortunately, people like Ed Nadalin brought a kind of discipline to freestyle skateboarding turning it into something that could be enjoyed by spectators and riders alike.

Stacy Peralta makes the point that, deep down, a

professional skater must be an entertainer. Unless you're discussing racers — in which case all that needs to be displayed is speed to justify the paycheck — pro riders must provide enjoyment through their skating.

The chances are if a crowd applauds a set, it's because a rider's getting stoked on doing it. It's an interesting point to remember that nearly all good skaters are useful dancers. Maybe it's because good dancers have a high degree of abandonment .. they tend to give in to the natural rhythm. In a top pro freestyle session everything seems to naturally flow, from one manoeuvre to the next. The sequence has a solid feel about it, rather than appearing as just a collection of tricks.







and find yourself in an almost totally enclosed bowl — with just a narrow entrance point (rather too narrow, in fact). The bowl takes up around 320 degrees of a circle and stretches up to a height of 6m (vert starting at 3m). Si Napper found it suited his style the best and he was the first to hang a wheeler and carve two wheels out. Bobby Boyden soon had kick flips wired — 4m up as did Jingles.

These last two features, together with the two half-pipes downstairs, form the advanced sections of the park and should go a long way towards improving and influencing many of the local skaters — all credit to the designers and executors.

Arrow Skateboard's initial involvement with skateboarding happened when the company directors realised the urgent requirement for safe skating areas in the West Midlands. Managing Director, Steve Tyzzer, relates:

"The company had a vacant site in the middle of Wolverhampton . . . and it's potential as a skatepark was recognised. A design and construction team came together and they went to the States to study the whole business. As a result, they built the Arrow Skatepark . . . to provide as wide a range of facilities as possible."

Expansion-wise, there are plans afoot to use the next two storeys for skating and finally to build a club room on the top floor. And apart from that, there's still room downstairs for more half-pipes and even full pipes.

Four hundred skaters can be catered for at one session — each session lasts 2 hours and costs 50p. All safety equipment is hireable and there's a package comprising board and all safety gear for 50p a session.

The park is situated in Broad Street, about two minutes from British Rail Wolverhampton. Hot and cold snacks are available in the building and there's also a very good sound system for those connoisseurs of music while you work.


