activity as a number of items on which the SSA has been working for some time come to fruition. Perhaps the most significant is that all the UK skateboard associations (English, Northern Irish, Scottish and Welsh) have now agreed to attend a meeting with the aim of setting up a UK Skateboard Federation. The meeting was called by the Scottish Sports Council, the outcome of which will be reported next month. This should lead to a period of greater stability and co-operation in the organisation of the sport and in the staging of national and UK level contests on a regular basis.

lain Urguhart, now the SSA's facility advisor, has been working hard on the many new Scottish skatepark schemes proposed. It's through the encouragement of careful consideration of design and construction of the new generation of skateparks in Scotland that we expect the sport to progress. Consequently the SSA is putting a good deal of its present effort into this aspect. Facilities are proposed in Glasgow, Edinburgh and Livingston.

The SSA was recently represented at a meeting to set up a European Skateboard Federation, held in Paris. This body's next meeting will discuss European rules and a representitive European Championships for 1979. The SSA expects to be at that meeting to take care of the interests of Scottish skateboarders.

Skateplaces

Sadly, a great deal of the news this month is of closures, some temporary, others more permanent.

LYTHAM ST. ANNES

On a temporary note, Lytham St. Annes Pier Skatepark has locked its doors for the winter - due to the pier's wood construction and treacherous position. But manager, John Rose, reports a very successful year and big plans for 1979 when the park re-opens in March/April. Unfortunately he's unable to put in a pool/bowl. . because the pier legs probably won't stand the weight. Meanwhile, local hot rider, Ian (King Smurf) Parry, is lost without somewhere to practise - more so because the next nearest park, at Southport, has also shut-up shop for the winter. In case Lytham St. Annes Pier is swept away by the winter gales, anyone going transatlantic on the QE2 is advised to keep their eyes open for runaway parks.

KETTERING

Sadly curtailed is the indoor Skateside Stadium at Kettering (see issue 9). From an auspicious beginning when many a London hot-shot made the journey up there to use the fine, timed slalom run and the full pipe, attendance has dropped since the stars stopped coming. In an attempt to keep the park profitable, the management has expanded the all-round sports activities and the skatepark itself only operates a couple of days a week and at weekends. It's a great pity, considering such talents as Peter Lee (slalom), Ally Barr (pipes) and two females, Debbie Brown and Michelle Lee all issued from the heyday of Skateside.

WOLVERHAMPTON

News has just come in that Arrow Skatepark in Wolverhampton has closed its doors. The news obviously shattered a number of local, regular skaters who were near-tears when the news broke. It seems inconceivable that a park as apparently as successful as Arrow has to close. The man who took the disasterous decision was Tracknology boss, Howard Clayton-Wright (see Lip Torque last issue). Contact with him is difficult as he sits most of the day in his pyramid, surrounded by henchmen. Those wishing to support the agitation to have Arrow re-opened should contact Pam Edwards on 021 554 0153.

WANDSWORTH

Another possibly terminal case is Skatecircus in London. Even though on a recent Sunday, against considerable competition from the huge contest going on at Windsor. around 170 kids paid to go in, still the owners (Skateopia/Granada) have decided to lock the doors. The reasons they give seem more managerial than financial. . . appeals are in hand. A strange rumour we heard was that (ex?) Skateopia man, Arthur Howard, turned up himself to lock the doors. Surely this can't be true?

BECKENHAM

Better news comes from Kent where the Glass Rider Skate-park at Beckenham, having recently undergone a change of ownership, continues to roll right on. Thursday/Friday sessions are 4-6pm and there are four, 2-hour sessions between 10am and 6pm at the weekends. Price is 50p per session.

BURNHAM-ON-SEA

Another up-and-coming facility is at the Mid-Somerset Leisure Centre at Brean, near Burnham-on-Sea. Local sports

and skateboard store owner, Reg Cox, has gone for a build-as-you-earn policy and is evolving the park slowly, rather than pumping money straight in at the start. Having done most of the work themselves, the park already features two 10 foot high ramps, a mogul maze/freestyle area and possibly the largest freestanding half pipe in the country. Even the top local riders have been defeated in their efforts to get wheelers. The next facility in the park - a 12 foot deep, blue-tile pool, should be completed by the time you're reading this.

It's quite certain that there're many parks whose facilities do no justice to the sport, and these are fast falling by the wayside. However, many excellent parks are in danger of becoming endangered species through lack of support. The closure of these places is only giving fuel to the 'skateboarding is dead' brigade, so it's the duty of every rider to engage in a 'support your local skatepark' campaign, Many people have spent months petitioning for a park to be built in their area, but now it seems complacency is creeping in. Most parks were started as commercial propositions (more's the pity) and now they're getting cold feet. So, skateboarders, get to it!

Contest News

With winter drawing in, many parks are offering competitions on their menu in an effort to maintain interest among customers. In the West Country, a contest circuit is under way amongst the major parks and their teams. Sunday 29th October saw the first in the series at the Earth 'n' Ocean park at Barnstaple. Events were high jump, freestyle and in the recently built performance bowl signed by resident pro, Ben Liddell - freestyle bowlriding and one-wheelers. Teams were entered from Earth 'n' Ocean, Steve Daniels, Plymouth, Exmouth Skatepark, Cabadelo, Torquay and Bristol Skateboard Centre. Riders were competing for medals, top quality equipment and the team prize, the 'Fresh Air' trophy. SKATEPARK SUPERTEST

BLACKLION, GILLINGHAM

Owned and managed by Alfred Faccenda, designed by G-Force and built under intensive supervision by Skatepark Construction, the park takes up an overall area of around 2250 sq. metres. Not, by any stretch of the imagination, a large park (certainly by Rom standards), Blacklion has just four runs they being the standard G-Force pool, half pipe capsule, snake run and slalom/freestyle/bank patch. But, that said, the diet of concrete offered is quite excellent in terms of construction, finish and design.

CONSTRUCTION

It's got to be said that one of the basic reasons for Gillingham's success is its nearflawless construction. The Gillingham has had a long wait for it's first skatepark, principally because the local council changed its collective mind twice about where to put it! It wasn't until August, rather than the planned February, that it finally opened up shop. On the 'Test Team for the Day' menu were Si Napper, Hugo Carey and Caspar Peacock, all of whom, despite some very British drizzle, found the stop-over totally worthwhile. . . they say Gillingham's Blacklion has some very respectable teeth. Though limited in sheer size, physical finish and inbuilt enthusiasm make it one of the most together sites the Team's ever visited.

park was built in about 5 weeks and beautiful weather helped to insure good finishes and transitions. Another important factor was that Skatepark Construction and G-Force men, Tony Wynne and Adrian Rolt were able to supervise the building personally and offer advice

during the construction period. Good relations with Alfred Faccenda helped a lot, not to mention the fact that they were using their own contractors. With all these factors going for them, the companies were able to perfect a new type of shotcrete finish that's fast, grippy

HALF PIPE

The half pipe capsule measures 5.5m in width by 11m long, with a depth of 2.75m; half-bowls at either end measure 2,75m in radius. The run just about reaches vert all the way along and everybody on the Test Team remarked on its superior riderating. So far as finish and surface smoothness are concerned, this has to be one of the best half pipes around. The transitions are perfect and it's fun to work - very different from the more traditional British fare of bumps and kinks, mixed with a liberal dose of rider paranoia. Hugo Carey in particular was frightening the spectators with outrageously

extreme tailblock aerials.

POOL

A classic G-Force pool, 6m wide, 2.75m deep and 12m from end to end, with a 6m run-in. Definitely the best of the genus so far, according to Napper, Carey and other worthwhile sources, it features faultless transitions to vertical. Double axle-grinds turned out to be the thing to do on the day we were there and, although there's not the usual marbelite coating, in fact the new-version, ultra-smooth shotcrete - plus coat of pool paint - seemed to work even better.



SNAKE RUN

The snake, with its 10m wide bowl at the bottom end, could be criticised a little on the grounds of slowness. Nonetheless it's fun to ride, starting at ground level and descending a maximum of 2.5m. The finish and transitions are again perfect, with virtually no cracks, bumps or lumps to speak of. The bowl (which apparently wasn't in the design originally and was formed at a late stage by the 'removal' of the final bend) is slightly too wide for its depth; that makes forevering slow and rather tiring. Having a snake

finish in a bowl is a rather dubious idea anyway as it tends to cause crowding around the top end...not a good condition to suffer at a small park where maximum flow is crucial.

SLALOM RUN

Linking with the freestyle patch is a slalom run that's 20m long and 6m wide, with a lean of 5%. It's just wide enough for head to head and, as ever, very smooth. In this case, though, the surface also offers some very necessary grip for the needs of the cone brigade.

FREESTYLE/RESERVOIR

The freestyle/reservoir measures 14m by 12m and has varied angles and lips to the surrounding banks; the area is also on a very slight gradient. The general Team concensus was that the reservoir works very well indeed ... you can forever round and round, using many a route, and the differing angles help loosen-up style and technique in wondrous fashion. The transitions, as usual, are perfect and the finish. superb.

GENERAL

For the future there's a 6.5m full pipe scheduled around Easter this year and other expansionary moves include a large clubhouse where riders can hang-out or shelter from the cursed rain. Park capacity runs to about 100 skaters maximum (any more and queuing levels would become unacceptable). So far there've only been a few damaged limbs - all in the opening week; since then there've hardly been any bad injuries at all.

Alfred Faccenda is running his (insured for £50,000) park on very much a family basis; his wife and daughter help out a good deal. Together they're trying to foster and nourish some sort

of real community spirit.
Right now, however, it does lack a little atmosphere, mainly due to the fact that there's no 'sensurround' music; a row of houses runs down one side of the park,

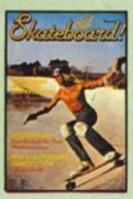
Blacklion saw its first competition held on 22nd October, with six teams taking part. Coming soon, though, there's likely to be a more major contest, the park co-sponsoring with Benjyboards. Certainly BB team members have become great fans of Blacklion and it's not surprising, considering the quality of ride offered. The overall cost of the project ran-out around £25,000 (probably one of the few honest costing we've been given!) and it's been money well spent. There's no need to inject enormous sums into building a good skatepark and Gillingham's Blacklion proves that. Finally, the marshalling was good enough and in case of injury, there's a prompt first-aid service available on site at all times

Charges are as follows: 50p per 2-hour session and £1.50 all day at weekends. For £4 a year you can become a member and you'll be able to skate for 40p a session. There'll also be a 10% reduction on anything you buy in the pro shop.

Hire charges are 10p for arm and knee pads, 20p for a helmet and 30p for an average board. The park is in Mill Road, Gillingham and it forms part of the Blacklion Sports Complex. The best way to get there is by train from Victoria (if you live in or are coming via London) and it's only a 10 minute walk from Gillingham station to the park.

INTERVIEW

The story starts around May of last year. One sunny afternoon as the Test Team toiled away in London's Hyde Park - putting the Skateboard! DIY Sailboard through its paces - a lone American scooted up. Introductions were made, pleasantries exchanged and friendships struck. . . and that was the British skate-scene's first encounter with Tim Altic. Things moved fast; basing himself in Bristol, Tim's stylish, go-for-it expertise both in skateboarding and rollerskating soon had the local's wondering just what had descended among them. Danny Acton-Bond says it all in this quote, held back from last month's feature interview: "He's a really hot rollerskater - one of the hottest in the world - and he's a fantastic skateboarder as well. He's got a beautiful style and he's very original. His airbornes on rollerskates are something every skater should see. People around here idolise Tim - and why not? He's an absolutely amazing guy and he enjoys what he's doing as well."

Rocky Brann and Tim Altic run through some facts of skating life. . .





How do you see yourself in the skating scene these days. . . do you consider yourself pro, semi-pro or what?

I guess I'm a pro because I'm living off the sport. It makes me money and I do nothing but skateboard and rollerskate. I've written a couple of articles for the magazine and I'm totally involved in the scene. I don't do anything else.

How would you compare the skating and the technical sides of what's going down right now with the situation in the States? That's parks, equipment, riders. . . the whole thing. I'd say things here are moving at basically the same rate as they are in the States. It's just that California has had 16 or 20 years head start on everybody. Of course that 16 to 20 years hasn't been all development. It's just lately, since the early 70's that the major changes and improvements have been made so.

like, in a way you started out ahead of things. You progressed from plastic and metal wheels to the urethane version much faster than we did; but I don't think the level of skating has as yet had time to develop.

Would you say that's reflected in the way people ride over here?

Yeah, definitely. I'm not saying that people in the States are better or. . .

A lot of them are.

Well they are better in the way that they have developed a style whereas skaters in the UK are still searching for one they can call their own. . . perhaps I shouldn't put it that way! There ARE people here developing certain styles - particularly pros like Simon Napper and Jeremy Henderson, those folk are setting the pace.

It's not just Britain imitating America?

Maybe in part. . . there IS still a lot of imitation going on. Would you say that there's

riders here who HAVE successfully developed their own style and who haven't been influenced by the States?

Definitely. . . I don't think any of the pros here really copy people in the States. Everybody takes ideas from other skaters. I mean. that's the only way to do it. You have to skate with as many people as you can and at as many places as you can. That comes back down to the parks again. I'd say that a great injustice has been done here in Britain by the guys who made most of the parks. It seems to me that they've screwed up the scene because you go to this park, you go to that park, and then the other park and they're all basically the same.

I must say skaters over here would generally agree with you that most parks are far too formularised and 'samey'. putting it less politely, boring. So in other words

you're saying that in the States, California especially, the people who design skateparks are generally more in tune with what's going on ... that they consult the skaters before moving in? Right! You see, what construction people have done this end is go over to the States and take hold of the easiest things they can see that're popular. . . and then copy them. They come back over here and make the same stuff over and over again, to the point that often they reproduce this copy six, seven or eight times over. It's the same half pipe with maybe a different mistake here and there. The skaters themselves have had little or no part in developing these parks, whereas in the States, that's definitely the way it is now.

Do you think that's also true of the industry in terms of equipment manufacture? That people over here have for a long time just made

second-rate copies of what's arrived from the States always lagging behind? Yeah, until now. There are some people getting their heads together. . . Benjyboards for instance are beginning to do stuff of their own. They've got an excellent formula for their new wheel, the Boot, and they also have their own boards. They may be a bit heavy, but they don't break; they're a good design and they handle well, too, despite the weight. Of course they have some of the best skaters designing their skateboards and it shows. Actually there're new lines that've just arrived and they're made of rock hard maple - super tough and light too. They're probably the best decks ever brought out in this country. Taking all this into account, how do you think it's going to go? Are we likely to be left with a hard core of really together skatepark construction people and designers; a few businessmen who're really interested in skating and development of the sport; and finally, a dedicated group of skaters who are really into good riding and possibly making serious money out of it with less of the B.S.? I think that there exists a hard core of skaters and they are going to keep it alive. But there're some people who'll need to put some work into the scene to keep it strong. It's strong now. It's not a fad, it's a sport. And now that it's made that transition it has to prove itself as a real, honest-to-god, no-fooling sport. Serious too. . . there's got to be a serious side to it to keep it alive for the people that are just in it for enjoyment.

How do you compare the social side - the attitude that American skaters have, the way they skate, the way they approach skateboarding as enjoyment and the kind of things they do - the kind of people they are? As you said earlier, there's quite a few British skaters who're more concerned with getting rad and pulling off stuff than just plain enjoying themselves. they miss out on some good kicks. Is that where the main differences lie?

I can't really pin it down to

one thing. People have this

funny idea in their heads that

they've got to look a certain

way; they skate for the pose and not necessarily for the feeling. . . they skate to do a trick but not to feel the high. Sure some people get into it I'm not saying they don't. What I am saying is that there aren't enough of them. The reason there are pros here is that pros DO get in and feel what they are skating. That's what makes them good. It's easy to tell if somebody is good really there are so many skaters who can do a lot of tricks but who aren't any good because when they do them, they don't really

And then there's other skaters who are just into slalom but, you know, those slalomers get in there and feel. A slalomer in a 'snake' is doing nothing but feeling the terrain, his pump, the flex of his board, the turn of his wheels, the slides and so on. That's really feeling when you're skating.

Presumably a lot of the moves originate like that... from riders doing what feels good — letting the tricks just happen, rather than actually thinking about what will look the best. But where does flow enter into the equation?

There's two different kinds of go-for-it. There's unthinking go-fo-it, and then there's flow go-for-it. Somebody that really goes-for-it is skating, not to do a trick, but more to feel right. He goes up and for instance, he shoots over the lip. Okay, if he's really concentrating and really flowing and he goes-for-it at speed, he can get out over the lip and his board will fly up and he might even come off - but he's thinking fast enough and everything's flowing so he can put his feet back on the board and move his body in such a way that he stays there. That's exactly what's so amazing about Tony Alva. When he went-for-it, he went up and he did a grinder until he couldn't grind any more and then as he dropped down the wall - he was sitting back, way back and barely on - he was able to still get back up the other side of the wall and do something else. And you know, that's like flowing . . . taking whatever happens in your stride and flowing back onto course. The con-

centration needed is amazing

and you just can't be thinking, well, what does this look like and concentrating at the same time. You can concentrate on what I look like now, or you can concentrate on where I am going after this interview. That's two different things and so many British skaters don't understand this.

With a heavy heart I think I'd have to say I agree with you. But let's move on to rollerskating now. You're heavily involved with Benjy now as their main roller man - in fact, Britain's only hot, park rollerskater. It's really hit big in the States but of course Britain is a totally different number and the people are something else again. How do you see yourself helping to develop and promote this new angle. . . how are you intending to pull it all together. . . do you have a schedule planned out? Well, there is a group of rollerskating people in Britain but they're restricted to rinks. I hear that there's a good ten thousand of them that skate a lot and there's a big area to get into . roller hockey, roller dance - you know, just for pleasure, and of course, racing; there's actually a British rollerskate speed team. But like I say, they're restricted to the rinks. I believe that with urethane wheels, plus the sort of publicity that Benjyboards can get together around me, we can show people that rollerskating isn't just going around in circles.

And there's plenty of places to skate without having to go to a rink. . . the streets to start with. Once people find out how great it is to rollerskate on the streets and in the parks on the bicycle paths, I think they'll really go-for-it. Benjy is going to try and push the idea and I'll do everything I possibly can to promote it. I believe that rollerskating, if you join it with skating, could bring back skateboarding to another high. And I'm talking about making indoor roller rinks with not just flat floors, but with banks and

Do you think it's going to be difficult to turn on existing rollerskaters to the possibilities of modern urethane? I'm not that clued up on rolling, but it does seem to me that, with the right

urethane for any given surface, you get just as much speed and control as any composition. Another thing, how hard is it going to be for them to get into banks, anyway?

That depends on the person. There's a lot of people who can't ride transitions and there's a lot of people who can - but they just don't know it. We're going to have to talk to these people and get them to try something new. We're going to have to make it look fun, exciting and not dangerous and that means approaching it with professional design-work as

Since you signed with Benjy, how have you been getting on? On the ideas side you've obviously been working a lot on designing various products and pooling ideas with all the other skaters. As an older skater and somebody who has had a lot of experience in the field, are they taking a lot of notice of you - are you getting anything creative out of it?

That's what I like about Benjy, they don't do anything without asking the team. Their team is there to tell them what skaters want.

So it's kind of inter-relation-

regards the banks. If we don't get it right we'll just kill it, There'll have to be several wheels - a range to help make the transition from the hard, hard compositions they're using right now. A soft wheel, compared to a hard wheel, is like a new world and skaters may or may not like it. We're going to have to find enough people who do.

ship?

Yeah, I can go in there and say anything and they're going to listen to me. Really, I can say anything. . . I can say this is rubbish or I can say this is good - it doesn't matter because we've got the right sort of relationship. They always ask our opinion and I'm sure that's exactly why Benjy is making it. That's the way everything

has got to go in rollerskating and skateboarding. . . it's going to be down to the people who are in it. It can't be just straight, commercial enterprises, business-men and

Every successful manufacturer in the States has had some involvement in actual skating first of all. . . the big business angle blew up later. And, conversely, most big commercial companies who've come in armed with all the money in the world have just blown it completely. Would you agree that's also very much the story of what happened over here?

Yeah, and there's also been some companies that have died because they failed to update their lines. They just settled back and watched everyone overtake. On the subject of switching

lines, originally when I first met you, you were not sure how long you were gonna stay in Britain - it was almost as if you were just passing through. That was quite a few months ago. . . do you see yourself getting a bit more settled now? I think so, although the farthest ahead I'll make any plans is next summer. What I'll do after that I have not a clue - no idea. Benjy looks like it's going to be good and if I can make some money, then I'll probably stay. With all the experience you've brought with you across the Atlantic, can you see yourself ever getting involved in association/ organisation work over here? Everything's so untogether in that respect. The Association (English) is a joke and there haven't been any good competitions - except for the small one at Brighton which was really great. Look at Henry Hester; he's been on the scene a long time and he knows what he's doing... even he's made some stupid mistakes AND will be the first to admit it. Over here in Britain, I'm sorry to say it, but most of the people involved in organising events shouldn't be allowed to have anything to do with skating. . . they're bad for the sport. The trouble is. skaters haven't had enough experience or time to move into that side of things. . unfortunately a lot of the

pros are still kind of irres-

ponsible. But I should say

that's something that'll

improve.

THE AXLE DROP

The essence of the axle drop manoeuvre is that the rider starts from a stationary stance. The board should be placed on the coping in such a way that it's resting on its trucks — with about

a quarter of the axle sticking out. Mount the stick and prepare. Get ready for the drop by bending your knees, thereby lowering your centre-of-gravity. . . you'll be more stable in the crouch position.







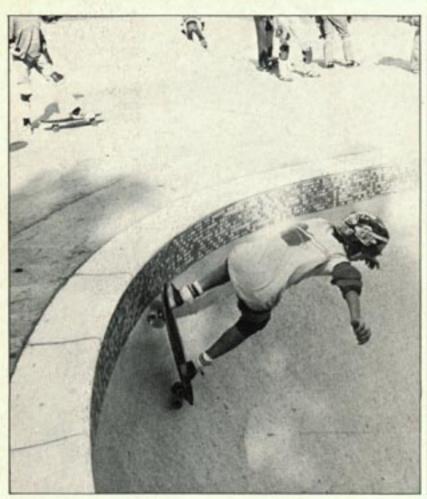
THE ROLL-IN

One of the gnarliest ways of entering a pool, the move involves rolling along the top of the lip/coping, then kickturning into a deep end. Roll-ins can be performed frontside or backside and, fluidity-wise, they make an ideal follow-up to a roll-out.

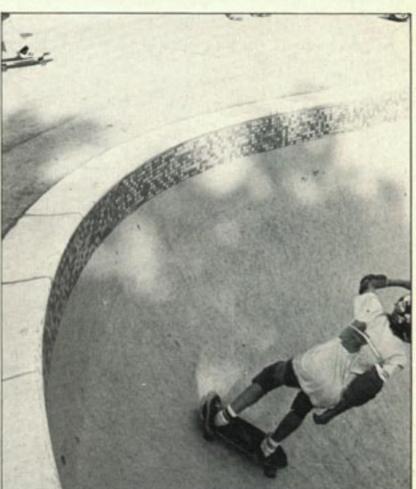
Procedure: approach the coping in a relaxed manner (if your nerves can take it) and at an easy pace. Just prior to the kickturn, crouch to lower your centre-of-gravity and lean into the coming turn.

The actual kickturn into the pool is the hardest part of the

The next move is the decisive one; kickturn off the coping and head down into the pool. Points to remember are as follows: swing your body round ahead of the kickturn; lean right into the pool as you go down. Failure to observe these rules



will almost certainly result in hang-ups.

As in our other featured going-for-it this month, the roll-in, with practise, you'll be able to accelerate during descent and work into other moves. Rider pictured. . . Paul Sully.



manoeuvre. The difference between making a good roll-in and wiping out horribly is in the order of a hair's breadth. . . the execution and timing of the turn have to be perfect. Just as the inner rear wheel 'edges', lift the front of the deck, pull it round, then drop-in.

WIDTH The first wide that I used was my own design, the 29"x8" Bigfoot. At first sight it looked huge and caused a lot of amusement, not to say downright mirth. Soon, however, there were quite a few 8 inchers around and the Bigfoot didn't look so strange anymore. Then, out of the blue, our local deck makers, Bristol Youth Workshops, produced the 32"x9\" Great Bigfoot, and again hoots of derision park. Now with the arrival

followed it and me round the of all the Bigguns it too looks normal... such is evolution. Foot control, leverage and stability are the most important features of deck design - the Test Tank all felt that the decks tested here were a definite improvements over earlier models. The confidence inspired by the stability inherent in wide decks allows both expert and beginner to extend abilities. LENGTH As boards get wider they also tend to grow slightly longer. The Alva at 29" is the shortest of the test batch with the Trade Winds Wide Ply, at 331/2", the longest. Deck length should of course be matched to a skater's height and riding stance, but it is worth remembering that in high speed situations a few extra inches on the length can make a lot of difference, stability-wise. CONSTRUCTION & MATERIALS Most of the decks we tested are constructed from 'Canadian Hard Rock' maple laminates. Given that minimum weight is desirable, this material, as far as wood is concerned, probably offers the best in weight to strength ratio. The exceptions to the rule are the Sims Superlight, the Ben Liddell, the Cheapskate and if we are to believe it, the Alva. The Sims is made from five layers of multi, cross-laminated brazilian ash; it's extremely light and has a beautiful feel. Ben Liddell's deck is made up of maple-zirconite laminates. When pressed for details he revealed that zirconite consists of epoxy soaked layers of uni-directional fibreglass mesh. This material is slightly heavier than a straight maple laminate, but it's very

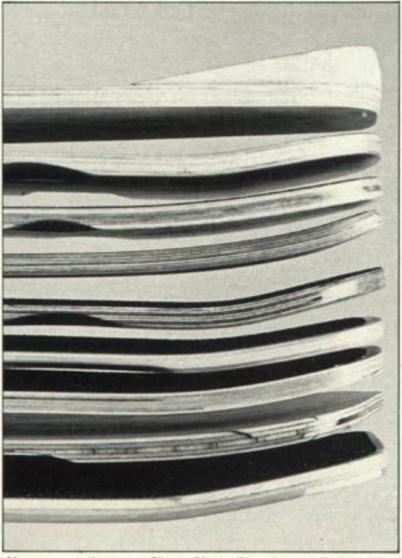
SKATA DATA PARKRIDING DECKS

THE WIDER THEY GET

The move to superwide decks — 9" plus — has resulted in a rash of new sticks from both English and Stateside manufacturers. The origins of the 'Pigs' as they have come to be known is somewhat uncertain, but as far back as last spring L.A. skaters Gunner Haugo and Lonnie Toft were turning heads with wider than usual decks. Of the many new models available we have chosen to test six from the States and four from the good old U.K.

Truck manufacturers have been quick to respond to the needs of the wide board. Lazer and Independent were the first to launch 8" Trucks.

We've taken the opportunity to check them on some of the wider boards. This month's tests were conducted by the Bristol Test Tank under the direction of Mike Wisternoff.

a good job. At 1460grams it's the second lightest deck tested after the Superlight.

The Alva deck, according to its importers, is made from Australian alva wood laminates. Now I've never heard of alva wood (to be honest, it looks mighty like maple to me), but who knows what sort of trees lurk in the outback. Only one thing, for maple it's very light indeed.

TRUCKS

HANGER WIDTH/AXLE LENGTH Two of the trucks tested here, the Lazer and the wide Independent, are made in the new superwide configuration - designed obviously to fit the new generation of wider boards. The Independent has a slightly wider hanger than the Lazer, giving it an extra 5mm/3/16" effective width. The other 'Indi' has the familiar full track width, but apart from that it's identical to the 8-incher. HEIGHT The Lazer has the same height as previous Lazer models. If your board has wheel wells and you skate with your steering damped down, you're unlikely to need the excellent 1/2" space pads included in the purchase price. If, however, like many of us carving is part of your bowl play, the risers will give you just about the right clearance. The Independents are quite low at 54mm/2-1/8" and except on full cutaway boards, risers are a must. **ACTION ANGLE This is the** angle formed between the underside of the base plate and the line formed by joining the two pivot points of the truck, one at the centre of the nipple and the other at the centre of the hanger ring. All of the three trucks tested had conventional action angles producing quite sharp steering. On a short board they would be very twitchy, but the Test Team felt they'd be just right for the new generation of pork (sic) boards. **CUSHIONS** Cushion hardness and resiliance obviously play a great part in the overall performance of a truck. The Lazer features urethane cushions which produce just about the perfect blend of stability and firmness. The Independent cushions are made from a conventional rubber compound offering a very light and sensitive steer-

ing, reminicent of Tracker 'blacks'. If you like loose, flexy steering they are very fine — most of the Test Tankers, however, replaced them with something a little firmer.

WEIGHT The extra axle and hanger width of the two wide models obviously carries a slight weight penalty but, that said, they are both well within acceptable limits, with the 7" Independent scoring one of the lowest weights yet recorded for an aluminium alloy truck.

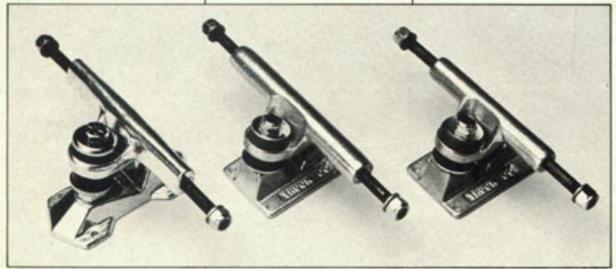
DESIGN Lazer trucks have always been made to very high standards and the 8" is no exception. It shares many similarities with the rest of the range including the excellent base plate thread insert. The axle casting is made very thick on the underside, intended no doubt to increase grind-life. A couple of the Test Team remarked that the angling back

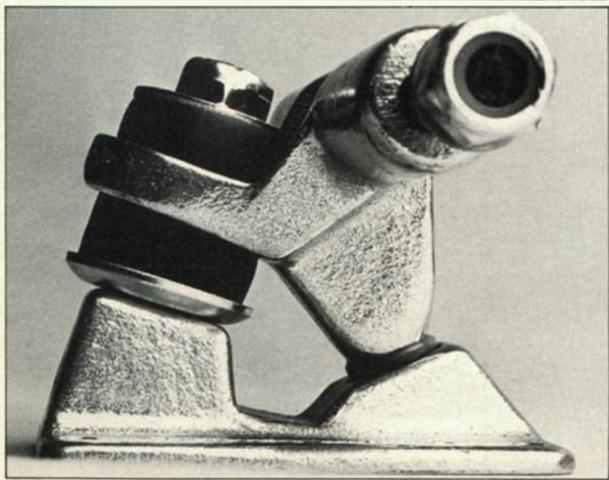

of the base plate allowed some sideways wobble which they noticed when poised to drop in over a square-lip. This minor criticism aside, it's an-excellent truck. The Independent trucks use the fixed king pin principle to good effect. The top nut is tucked well down behind the axle and the whole hanger-yoke area has a very neat and clean profile. The front pivot,

compared to other trucks is massive. Hopefully this will strengthen what in many trucks is a weak point. Although the sets tested came through unscathed, feedback from retail outlets unfortunately indicate a wide variation in the quality of castings. Until this problem is corrected we can't recommend them to the aggressive park skater.

EQUIPMENT NEWS

The file is as usual jampacked with exciting new products. Wheels due to arrive at the time of writing are the WEED WHEEL and from G&S the new Steve Cathay designed YO-YO range. The WEED WHEEL features a bearing seat insert and a 45 degree angled back face which is said to eliminate hang-ups. The urethane, known as Upjohn 10-1, is claimed to be a completely new formula. The new YO-YO's include a 94A 65.5mm dia, ULTRA-SPEED PARKER in orange or green and a white all rounder at 86A durometer.

New trucks on the scene include 8" models from GULLWING and MEGA-TRON with TRACKER and ACS working on their own superwides. Although similar in appearance to the rest of their trucks the new TRACKER X-TRAC is, it's claimed, an entirely new design. Not to be left out ACS weight in with their new adjustable track 8" available either in aluminium or magnesium alloys. Although it's not a particularly new product the BAR X truck from FREE-WHEELER of Pershore deserves a mention. It comes supplied with 6" and 7" interchangeable axles, the king pin is easily replaced and it's guaranteed for a year. Not bad for £3.99.

G&S have a massive new arsenal of boards with their PRO-LINE and PRO-TAIL series. The PRO-LINES are 9½" wide and come in three lengths – 28", 30" and 32" and the PRO-TAILS are available in the same lengths but feature 8", 8½" and 8½" widths. In addition all models in both ranges can be obtained, made from either maple laminates or maple fibrecore laminates.

Another new line of decks soon to be available here is the BAD CO. range, featuring three parkers and three freestyle decks. The park decks are designed by Curt Kimbel and Mike Weed and measure 9½"x30", 9"x28" and 10"x30". All three are maple-glass laminates. The freestyle decks are the WEED 7"x28" foam/fibreglass — the STEVE

DAY 6%"x26" maple-glass laminate and the CHRIS LARSON 7%"x26", also in maple-glass.

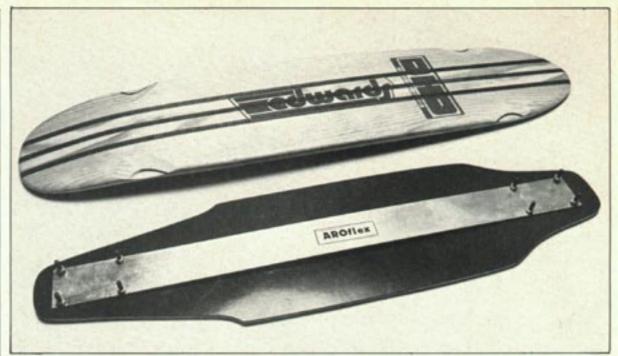
It's not often you see a new slalom deck from a British manufacturer but the ARO-FLEX is just that. It's unusual in that its flex rate is adjustable. There's a thin steel plate connecting the front and rear trucks, lying flush to the underside of the board. When this plate is deflected by tightening the small grub screw in the centre of the deck - with the key provided - the moment of inertia is increased; that is the deck effectively gets thicker. Initial trials indicate that the system works well and we will be giving it a full test soon.

Anytime now we take delivery of two sets of rollerskates - the BENJY SKATE and the ACS OFF-THE-WALL SKATES. The BENJY features a moulded synthetic fibre boot with a foam inner sock, laces, aluminium base plate, toe strap and ACS 430 trucking systems. They are made in sizes 6 through to 11. The ACS is a lightweight skate based on the Van's 'High Top' boot. It has a full foot fibreglass base plate and like the BEN-JY uses ACS 430's. They come in full and half shoe sizes.

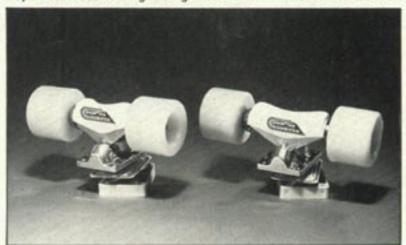
ON SECOND THOUGHTS

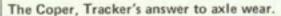

The G&S YO-YO (ORANGE) is a real scorcher with very quick acceleration, the ultimate roller skate parker. . . Kryptonics new BLUE WHEEL (C. SERIES) has emerged as a class all round park wheel, the new GREEN (C. SERIES) however is just too surface sensitive and slides too easily for most. . . although it's handling characteristics are good the Z GROOVE has poor wearing qualities, our set wore out in just one week.



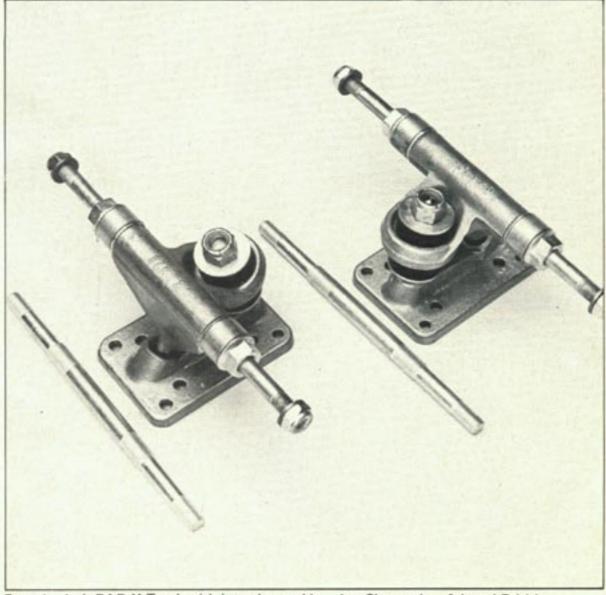
Top: Freewheeler's lightweight 31"x81/2" Edwards deck. Above: Aroflex's slalom stick.

THE BRITISH OPEN SKATEBOARD CHAMPIONSHIP

Pete Christopherson reports...

The British Open Championships were held at the Skatewave Park, near Windsor, on the weekend of November 18/19th. The contest was sanctioned by the British Skateboard Federation (nee Association) and the contributing sponsors were ACS, G&S and Pacer. It turned out to be the largest gathering of skateboarding talent to be held in the UK this year and, in particular, it provided Skateboard! with the opportunity of checking over 250 pro and amateur riders as they competed through seven events.

It was lucky this ambitiously titled contest was held at the indoor park of Skatewave, since the weekend was deluged with rain; even so, one of the events managed to get rained off! Riders assembled from all over the country to enter both team and individual competitions... there were visitors from Glasgow, Grimsby, the Midlands, the West Country, Wokingham, the South Coast, London and the Home Counties. As it turned out it was lucky no more decided to come as the contest proved to be totally oversubscribed; that was to cause the organisers quite a few headaches.

This time last year, the BBC programme, Nationwide, embarked on a series of events, culminating in finals at the now late, lamented Skatecity; it was from there that many of our current top skaters emerged. The ramshakle series was not without its organisational shortcomings but then, one could imagine the inexperience of the people in charge. (It's a shame that nowadays the networks give such little coverage to organised competition since today's standard of skating is far superior). No, Windsor '78 provided different problems. The staff and volunteer helpers had shown plenty of form in presenting local contests but on this occasion they'd could chew. The entrants bitten off more than they were to be processed through heats on the Saturday, finalists to fight out the deciding rounds on the Sunday (with the exception of half pipe riding which was concluded on the first day). Unfortunately, things didn't exactly turn out as planned.

The day had all the necessary ingredients for bigtime competition. Steve Cathey, top US pro and G&S rider, variously demoed, judged and presented prizes (apart from one group of junior winners who received their awards from the very out-of-place but full frontal, Fiona Richmond... resplendant in leopard skin leotard). Several British pro teams were competing, along with much of the cream of the UK's amateur riders - plus other young hopefuls. Events held were half pipe freestyle, half pipe one-wheelers, tight slalom, freestyle and 360's and while all this was going on, strictly amateur long and high jump competitions were being staged in a bid to establish national records.

For the main contest, competitors were split into age groups of up to 14, and 15 and over - with no distinction being made between amateur and professional. Practice evening on the Friday showed very clearly that few of the top Am's were able to match the very talented Benjyboard pro team whose performances were to dominate every event in the

Saturday's prepared programme was to work slowly through the long and high jump heats, the junior and senior half pipe complete and the junior freestyle heats. The organisers showed a marked reluctance to run events simultaneously with the result that, for competitors and spectators alike, the programme moved at snails

There were few surprises or upsets in the results, but the fun/competitive atmosphere that prevailed at the Brighton Barn, SCSA contest earlier this year was largely missing. Frequent, hysterical attempts at regimenting the kids over the PA system undoubtedly didn't help and perhaps anyway we needed the sunshine and atmosphere of an outdoor park; the sluggish pace certainly didn't assist, either. At any event, by the close on Saturday it had become clear that mountains would have to be moved on Sunday if the competition were to be able to draw to a respectable conclusion. Neither senior nor junior slalom heats had taken place , nor for that matter had the senior freestyle heats.

Events started on Sunday with junior, followed by senior slalom, organised on a head-to-head basis. Each pair of competitors had one run only down the undulating course and the first over the finish line with a 'clean' run (no more than 2 cones displaced) went through to the next round. Without a timing system there was no proper check kept on performances and many a borderline decision meant a disappointed racer being dumped early on. The first round was plagued by non-appearance of competitiors, so no organised draw was possible. Top slalom riders were eager to use their first opportunity of 1978 to sort out private feuds, though national champions, Jock Paterson and Tim Levis were conspicous by their absence. However, those present included John Shayer, Tim Pantin, Jim Slater, Brian Kelner and Martin Pavey. . . a line-up nobody could complain about. An early start saw Tim Pantin relegated and a draw that pitted John Shayer against the very swift Brian Kelner arranged for Shayer's early retirement from the competition.

Slalom racing is an area of skateboarding that requires both dedicated training and continuous competition to keep riders in top-notch form. The event has developed far more in the States where the hot riders compete throughout a 'season' of slalom-only competitions, known as 'Another Roadside Attraction'. It was a pity this contest had to be the one to provide the one and only

outing for British slalom specialists this year, for the event suffered severely from poor organisation and bad marshalling. It did, however, turn up a very worthy champion. . . Martin Pavey, slalom rider and bowl-carver extraordinaire, whose local stomping ground is Skatestar Park in Guildford. The event also provided one of the great revelations of the contest. Jeremy Henderson yes, Benjy's guvnor freestyler took a very creditable third placing, proving what a naturally talented, all-round skateboarder BB's top pro rider is. He rarely trains at slalom, but his determined competitiveness carried him through some stiff opposition.

Next on the programme was the senior freestyle heat. featuring around 60, 11/2 minute routines. It's good to see how the overall standard continues to improve although, in the main, British freestyle lacks the finesse and fluidity of the American interpretation. Steve Cathey demonstrated very clearly that Stateside freestylers put a great deal more thought into the construction and presentation of their routines; it was also depressing how many entrants thought Tshirts and jeans made a compliment costume for what should be the most graceful of all skateboarding disciplines. Style and presentation accounted for onethird of the marks awarded. John Shayer's final fourth placing, for instance, was not due to any particular technical artistry, it was more down to the panache with which he performed his legendary, stationary samoan squat while, at the same time, stripping himself of helmet, track-top and dramatically - his T-shirt!

All through the freestyle variations the crowd were waiting for the Benjy team's routines. Jeremy Henderson took the floor, only to suffer an unfortunate interruption midway through his performance; one of the judges objected to the fact that he was not wearing a helmet -- an article Jeremy rarely uses for flatland freestyle. Though allowed to restart, it soon became obvious his composure had been badly shaken. The remainder of the BB team showed that the pros are staying one step ahead of the majority of

freestylers, the only obstacle being Mark Slough, a local amateur rider, who performed a very cocky but superbly precise display to earn himself a rather disputed top position in the heats.

Unfortunately, the organisers realised time was running short and declared the overall placings on the results of the heats. To Jeremy, banking on a chance to redeem himself, this was a great blow. Perhaps his only consolation was that a similar decision was made with regard to senior half pipe freestyle, held the previous day (which he promptly won!). Here the dominance of the BB pros was complete - a tribute to hard graft, natural skill and many a demo. Hot manoeuvres included inverted aerials, frontside hand-downs and aggressive snapbacks (a rear-truck sliding grinder); the overall standard of pipe riding was very

Not long after the junior '3-wheels out' contest got underway in the (woodencopinged) half pipe, large pools of water appeared via leaks in the ceiling and we had the amusing sight of an indoor contest being held up by rain! Finally the event got started and the results showed, if proof be needed, that the younger Benjys also rip with supreme ability.

The junior freestyle final that followed demonstrated the real value in holding preliminary heats. The standard of the twelve finalists was consistently excellent and an observing Steve Kelner (sidelining through injury) reckoned that the level was every bit as high as that shown by the seniors. They had many of the tougher tricks wired but lacked the style of more mature performers. Robbie Hunter from Skatewave captured the top-spot.

The final event before the postponed prize giving was the long jump and, again, much as in high jump, British riders rivaled American standards of excellence, New UK records were set, the most promising competitor being Trevor Baxter from Burgess Hill who jumped 4'8" up and 12' along (in the 14-16 grouping). The most thrilling finale of all occured in the 17 plus age section with Robert Bruce (Zenie) of London's Hangten just scoring over Jingles from Trade Winds with a winning leap of 16'6".

A vast array of skateboards and parts were donated by Pacer, ACS and G&S, as well as silver trophies. The Benjys raised a cheer by announcing that all equipment won by the team would be donated to a children's charity. Although certainly a handsome gesture, there's little doubt that the team would have preferred the 'folding' variety of prize. There's little point in handling out standard equipment to the pro rider with 'everything'.

Criticisms of the contest were not hard to find. . . the slow pace of events, inadequate and inexperienced marshalling, serious cases of non-rider judges failing to perform their function fairly or precisely, and a general lack of atmosphere. But, at least the contest was OVER subscribed, thus disproving the 'skateboarding is dead' theory. This was confirmed by Skatewave General Manager, Derek Robertson-Pryde, who revealed plans for a further series of contests next year, backed by such names as Benjyboards, Pacer/ G&S and Kryptonics. "At these contests, amateurs will compete the previous weekend for a place against the pros in the finals and events will be more specialised. Benjy are hopefully sponsoring the freestyle in Feburary".

The competition was important in that it gave opportunity to established riders to prove themselves in top-level skating - some thing they hadn't been able to do since the Horti contest back in February of '78. In addition, it gave top amateur riders a crack at the pros. . . check the results table to see how they fared. Events like these are the show-piece of our trade and it was good to see such a high level of talent and sportsmanship.

But, that said, the British Open Skateboard Championships proved only a qualified success. To repeat a wellworn philosophy, probably not until the riders themselves show the inclination to take more control will we begin to see the kind of competition this country's riding standards deserve.

For complete results of the British Open Skateboard Championships, see page 58 It's hard to say exactly where something starts or for that matter, to pin down the exact moment a new movement is set rolling.

The birth of the holy rollers. . . those rollerskates with urethane skateboard wheels, used without regard for twodimensional rollerskating conventions, must have taken place over there in Dogtown with Kenny Means and Fred Blood.

If you include pictures as the catalyst of a new movement, then I suppose that's how it's got started over here. My first encounter was both typical and significant. I was staying with my brother, Mike, and a guy named Joe Wiffen who's more famous for designing and making kites and balloons than for anything related to wheels. Joe saw my skateboard and, like many of his and my generation, immediately reacted in two ways. One, how similar it was to rollerskates (to which, on account of his youthful experiences, he was able to relate) and, two, how fast these new wheels are.

Being a true old fool in the great tradition, he soon had his hands on a double set of ACS 430's, plus some small red Kryps—all paid for in true old fool tradition, ie with money he didn't have.

Within hours he was hurtling around the East End of

London with yours truly in pursuit on a skateboard. It was a bit like a prototype Concorde with a chaseplane in attendance. His first encounter with a street-full of traffic was nearly his last. The early, strap-on variety had no toe stops and never before had Joe hit 35mph on rollers. It's hardly surprising therefore that the artic driver who witnessed a madman doing an aerial 360 in a horizontal position while clutching a lampost probably failed to realise he was in at an historic moment.

A week or so later, and city gents were being passed by a 30mph pedestrian and London Transport had lost another customer — for good.

My second encounter with rollers is significant for more obvious reasons, as you'll soon understand if you suffer this super-waffle for a few more paragraphs.

It all began with a sailboard. I was cruising down the cycle path in Hyde Park on the board (without sail) with our now ex-tech Editor, Dave Goldsmith, plodding along behind, clutching sail and mast.

While walking around on this 53" monster, pretending to be in 'Crystal Voyager', I espied a rare bird, a real American with a rucksack and Maharajah board, I stopped to swop jargon and impress him with my monster (not everything is biggest in America, etc, etc). Having laid the first ego-punch he countered with a master parry and thrust, that tossed my poor ego to the ground. This demi-god was in possession of the holy grail. . . a set of Oak Street skates. He'd been among us mortals but half an hour, having descended from heaven courtesy of Freddie Laker.

Within an hour he was at the offices of Skateboard! and by that evening he was preaching to the converted at the newly-completed Maddog Bowl. His name was not Jesus Christ, but Tim Altic and the rest, as Norman Gosney would say, is history fans.

To what end, you may boldly ask, is all this autobiographical, self-indulgent, name-dropping B.S. aimed?

Well, these two encounters are both significant in their way for the birth of the holyroller in this country and what's more, they also represent the twin strengths of this double-edged resurgence. Rollerskates, like skateboards, are weapons of both street-warrior and vert-rider. Rollers are definitely where it's at, and although they're less safe to learn on, this is offset by the weight of skating experience locked-up in the childhood memories of most potential roller-addicts. For many, the problem is merely to recall the feeling and re-open those instinctive, motor-receptive pathways that one never really lost. The challenge then is the need to find a more polished technique with these new, anti-friction shoes.

The skateboard is unlikely to die. However, if in the future it ever should, it's major testimonial will read that it served as ground experience for the enlightened re-incarnation of the new rollerskate. Steve Kane

TECHNO TALK



The first thing to consider is terrain. Matching wheel-type to the surface of your skateplace is probably the most important factor of all when selecting wheels. The major polyurethane manufacturers have, over the past few years, developed a series of polymer systems for skateboard wheels which minimise rolling resistance, while allowing choice of a wide range of hardnesses (durometer) to suit various uses, styles and techniques.

If, for instance, your local park has very smooth concrete surfaces, you can take advantage of the freesliding characteristics of some of the harder wheels. On the other hand, if you skate on a more irregular surface, a hard wheel might be a disadvantage, since every time you hit the rough stuff the wheel, skateboard, and rider will be lifted a fraction of an inch and then lowered again. This type of vibration is not only uncomfortable, it can lead to control difficulties, energy losses and it can slow you down. The best choice here would be a softer wheel, to envelope such irregularities.

Ultimate speed seems to be the most common requirement of a wheel for most of us but it's worth remembering that speed alone is not the only consideration. It's a common sight at skateparks

WHAT'S IN A WHEEL

By Micky Wisternoff

Since the birth of skateboarding there've been dozens of different makes and types of wheels sold throughout the country. Many from earlier periods are still being sold alongside those of more recent manufacture and with such a wide range available, it would seem that there should be a wheel to suit everybody. But I know from experience of working behind the counter that many skaters

(a) don't know what they want and (b) often choose a wheel for the wrong reasons. Here then is what I hope's a useful guide to wheel choice.

to see less-than-expert skaters (myself included) rushing about on wheels that are faster than they can handle. If you find yourself pulling back rather than forcing, then its possible you're not ready for the wheels you're using. A switch to a slightly slower, and probably grippier, wheel may lead to an amazing improvement in technique and style.

My advice is that, unless you are an advanced skater with access to very good skating surfaces, then you should avoid rock hard wheels. The range of durometers available should enable you to select a wheel that's suitable both for your level of skill and your local terrain.

Another point to consider is your board-truck configuration. Ideally the overall width of your running gear (track) should be consistent with the width of your board. If the wheel of your choice sticks out beyond the board rail then either try a narrower wheel or go to a wider deck. Conversely if the track is much narrower, try a wider wheel for size.

The development of the modern, high resiliance wheel has been largely due to the use of liquid cast polymer systems. Wheels made by this method have a number of advantages over the earlier, thermo plastic injection moulded type. A much wider range of properties can be built-in by changes in prepolymers and curatives as well as processing conditions.

There is, however, an unfortunate side effect with with some of these materials. There've been many examples of early and rapid wear resulting from what appears to be uneven setting of the urethane. Careful examination of the back, face and running surface of the wheel

will often reveal visible pourlines, sometimes to the extent that the wheel will have distinct ridges in it. If your intended purchase has these flaws you should regard it with some suspicion. Sometimes a new wheel will pick up road grime very quickly; this too can be early warning of a high wear potential. Before you buy it's worth checking if your supplier is willing to replace faulty wheels.

Advertisements for wheels are, with some notable exceptions, pretty low on information. If we are to believe them then they are all the best. It's true that most modern wheels are made from similar compounds but as we've seen, design durometer and manufacturing processes have a marked effect on performance.

If your skateboard dealer knows his stuff you can take his advice - so much the better if he skates and is in touch with the local scene. When all is said and done. it must be remembered that wheel preference is an entirely personal affair. The only way to ensure that you make the right choice is by trying them. It shouldn't be too difficult to find a friend who already owns the wheels that you think you might like.

INURIES PART ONE



INJURIES, INJURY CHIC AND RELATED STATES OF UNREALITY Tim Dunkerley analyses the components of protection.

Anybody who spends a lot of time with skateboarders will notice a common factor among them. No, not the wearing of oversized American T-shirts and/or overpriced two-tone tennis shoes; it's their obsession with chronic (or recurring) bone fracture, scrapes and bruising.

In the early days (1976) of skateboarding's second coming, every interview with a top skater contained a reference to safety equipment. The gist of the message was that if people didn't use it, skating would return to oblivion, due if nothing else to the adverse publicity. Certainly on a theoretical level we must all advocate the wearing of the best possible safety equipment. But what I'm going to say here will not simply be an empty reiteration of that often mouthed and usually ignored statement. I'll be trying to deal instead with the realities of avoiding accidents and with the kind of injuries that

Unpleasant mementoes to a hard day's skate are the graze, the sprain - or worse - the fracture or break. Most riders rapidly overtake the 'it can't happen to me' stage. . . it probably already has. Unfortunately, acres of ill-timed, ignorant and grossly overplayed advice during the last year or so has tended in many people's eyes to relegate the subject to the 'boring' or 'good laugh' catagory. Yet this shouldn't be the case because the subject of accidents - both prevention against and recovery from demands to be taken seriously. This month Skateboard! chews a bite from one side of the injury apple as Tim Dunkerley, half of Brighton's famed 'rugby team', unweights his considerable experience to explore predominently the pre-injury aspects. Next month, Rocky Brann will be concentrating on the accident aftermath; he'll offer advice on posthospital treatment of breaks, fractures, damaged cartilages, torn ligaments and other serious conditions.

might occur whether you wear protective gear or not. My prime mover is the sight of all the plaster casts, limps and bandages I see around me down here in Pig City; I'm sure they exist wherever people go-for-it.

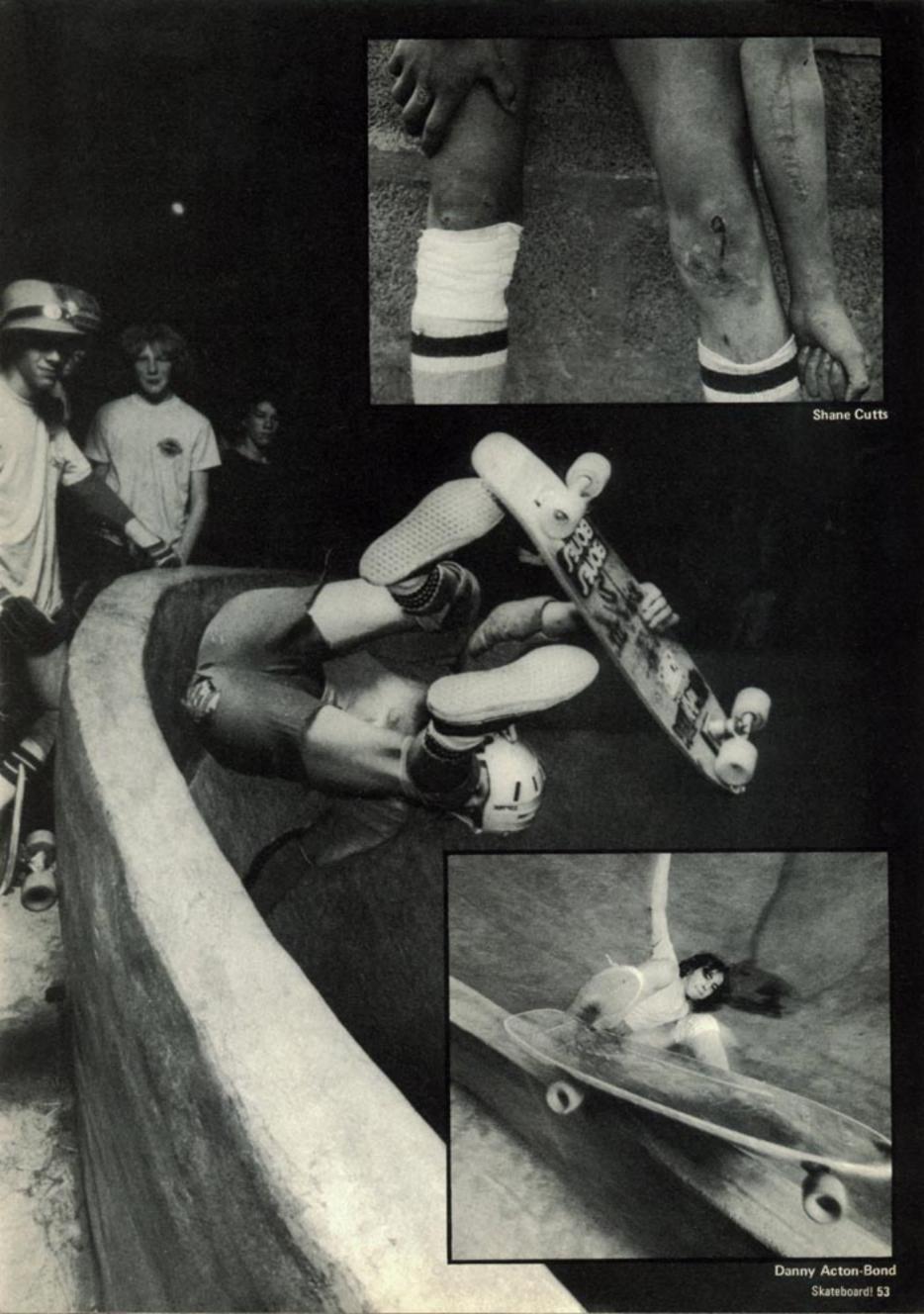
Most skaters wear safety equipment. In some cases, helmet, knee pads and gloves, in others just elbow and knee pads. There's endless permutations. . . I've even seen one rider with wrist braces, no knee pads, one elbow pad, inadequate freestyle (cycle) helmet and ankle guards!

So what's available? Well, starting from the top there's the helmet; they come with or without chinstrap and species vary in their strength, function and price. Then there's elbow pads, wrist braces, padded gloves, padded shorts, knee pads, shin guards (you can laugh but just ask any dedicated freestyler), ankle guards and shoes (not

worn as exclusively in the States as here). The quality of protection offered will vary enormously... choose your armour carefully to suit circumstances. Remember too that the amount of clothing you wear will also make some difference to the degree of abrasion you'll receive in a wipe-out.

Ultra-important is the availability of the correct size of whatever piece of equipment you're buying. Try if you can to avoid the cheaper (often ill-designed) gear. . . restrictive, inefficient or poorly-fitting pads are probably more dangerous than no pads at all. Restrictive equipment makes it more difficult for your body to get into good making or bailing positions, whereas the inefficient or poorly-fitting variety will just be plain dangerous.

All this shows the many decisions the individual skater must make with regard to safety equipment, not only in finding out the best value for money but, equally important, deciding which combination to wear. Not even the most safety-conscious of riders could see him/her-



self wearing all that's on the market. As the notable spurner (and sufferer from the lack of) safety equipment, Simon Napper, said to me when I offered him my Rector shorts for his aching hips: "If you're going to wear padded shorts, you might as well wear eyepads, and little finger protectors". Point taken Simon, but even Alva, the most famous spurner of pads, offers the advice: "If I get hurt, that's when I put on equipment. Like if I hurt my elbow or knee, I put on the pads". It's crazy not to protect an injury to save it becoming critically, possibly even permanently, debilitating.

Talking of the legendary TA brings us on to another point he made in his now famous interview about 'knowing how to fall'. He claims he doesn't need safety equipment because he knows how to save himself from injury. After seeing Kirk Talbot down here in Brighton, quite a lot of us are able to understand just exactly what 'knowing how to fall' means.

Kirk would be totally extended and committed to an upside-down frontside wheeler on the Cage's extremely tight, overhang half pipe, in his characteristic but apparently unstable close-footed stance. Realising he wasn't going to make it, he would hang on coming down, with only his two inside wheels still in the pipe and bail at incredible speed near the bottom. He would, as he put it, just 'jelly up' (relax completely), then pick himself up, smiling, from some of the hairiest wipe-outs we'd ever seen. He'd fall from the top to the bottom of the pipe with no apparent damage to himself. A precise and cat-like performer, I suppose he will hurt himself one day; the chances are, though, it'll be while stepping out of a limousine or by getting hit in the eye with a champagne cork.

But on to the problems of all us less fortunate skate-brothers and sisters. My own personal advice as to the absolute minimum of safety gear to be worn whilst tackling any kind of bank, bowl or incline is a good helmet (not the cheap, lethal variety that so many parks hire out) and knee pads — preferably those with plastic caps so that the knee, on impact, slides; sudden stop-

page can cause twists or dislocation. The above is for reasonably experienced skaters... novices should in my opinion wear the lot — at all times. Knees are very delicate things and if they hurt even a little, walking becomes difficult; when walking gets difficult, skating becomes well nigh impossible. A



helmet is essential because the head is, again, exceptionally delicate (certainly in comparison to a section of moulded concrete) and severe damage may cause a cessation of existance as we know it. Skating in the after-life is something nobody can forecast with confidence.

Actually it's useful to remember at this point that the only people ever to die while skateboarding in the UK (and some have) were either hit by a car, were not wearing a helmet, or both. Street skaters, mull on it.

Once the deed has been done and you have seriously damaged yourself, go to hospital — yes Mark, even you! Take heed of the hospital's advice in all matters, especially as regards the amount of theraputic exercise needed to limber up joints and muscles. Make it clear (though not in an

When the time comes and you think you're ready to get back into skating, forget it! Give yourself another week off, then start again on the flat. Don't shunt straight into the pool, bowl or snake run .. you'll probably end up in hospital again, sooner than you expected. Tony Alva has already covered the point about protecting an injury, but a further step in the right direction may be a reasonably tight (but not restrictive) crepe bandage over the recently recovered area. Placed under a pad, this gives the recovering joint a lot of useful extra support.

The psychological aspects of recovery cannot be dealt with in terms of hard and fast rules; here, however, are some ideas and attitudes you might find useful. You'll probably have to modify them to suit your own temperament:

Don't lose your bottle . . . skate hard in whatever area you favour. Go for the last cone, push for that grinder. Don't, however, go-for-it immediately. Work your way back in slowly. . don't be pushed by other people. If you have to, overact the pain if you aren't 100% mended - but don't get to enjoy the sympathy. Watch yourself re-learning as you get back into it. . . you'll discover important lessons about your ability to learn new tricks. An injury will make you more sensitive to your limits - or lack of them. In bank riding, fully remaster the old bag of tricks before going on to new stuff.

Injury chic is a considerably less important subject but one who's manifestations can be twice as bad as not being able to skate for months. Here the sufferer is the poor listener who gets told endlessly, and repeatedly, about the causes of and treatment to some skate-bore's injury. "I got hung-up, it was an intense micro-edger, and it just edged out and caught, I thought I could bail. . . my wrist didn't hurt at all - I thought my hip was worse but. . . this is my third plaster, or did I tell you that already. Of course I can still do freestyle, etc, etc. . . blah, blah, blah"

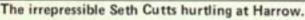
Variations include the opening gambit of... "You think that's bad, you ought to see this" — followed by much wrenching of clothes to expose cuts, bruises, lumps and swellings. Collective social points can be scored by groups of sufferers standing around conspicuously at skateparks, bleeding and limping, with casts, bandages, crutches and slings being displayed to the best advantage.

Don't be fooled by those who are proud of their wounds. There are other ways of being noticed at skateparks, like skating radically. I'm convinced that a major factor in anyone getting hot (apart from constant practise on the most radical terrain available) is becoming confident in two major areas. . . knowing how to fall well and having the right safety equipment to back-up this knowledge.

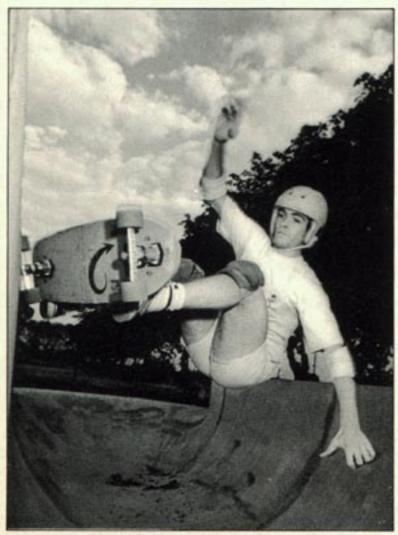

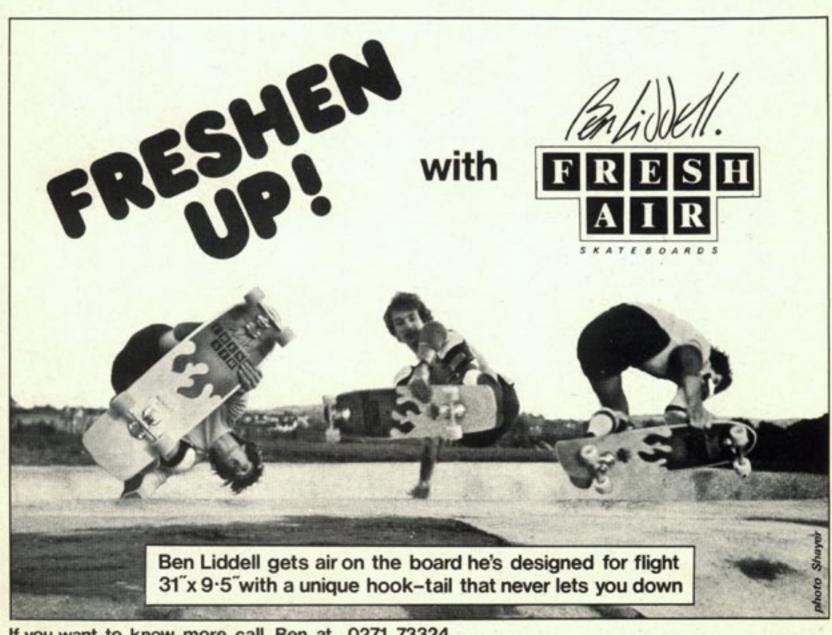
